

















LENGTH OF TIME TO HOUSING

HMIS DATA FROM 1/1/2019-7/31/2022




WHO IS COMING INTO THE COC? – FAMILIES

Montgomery County - CoC Family Inflow and Outflow




HOW LONG ARE THEY STAYING?




- The range of length of stay has decreased each month.
- The outliers show which populations are more likely to experience longer than usual lengths of stays in the CoC.
- Higher volumes in any one age group will skew LOS

PRIOR LIVING SITUATION – ADULT ONLY





PRIORITIZATION AND LOS - SINGLES



- High Acuity and LOS are not directly correlated
- Lots of clients with the same level of need compete for the same limited resources.
- Black Non-Hispanic clients make up the biggest group (304 clients) with an average acuity of 67
- White Non-Hispanic clients make up the 2nd biggest group (95 clients) with an average acuity of 81
