


Since publishing our inaugural issue two weeks ago, reopenings have cautiously proceeded to Phase 2 in Montgomery and Prince George's Counties, and the District of Columbia. Maryland's face-covering order, in its third month, is reinforced by a new campaign, [#MasksonMaryland](#). But nationally, July begins with over one-third of states – due to their spiking COVID case counts – in a “not so fast” reopening rollback, according to [tracking by Johns Hopkins University](#). Even Virginia's (including Fairfax County) July 1st move to Phase 3 featured the [Governor's last-minute hold](#) on restrictions on seating and congregating in bars.

In California, Florida, Georgia and New Jersey, the four counties from which we gleaned practice highlights (page 3) each share populations close in size to Montgomery County's 1.05 million, and with similar rates of diversity. COVID-19's disproportionate effect on certain subgroups is tracked more consistently via two new national COVID/equity databases (see “Resources,” page 2.)

Finally, although Montgomery County-sponsored July Fourth celebrations are cancelled, and residents are urged to celebrate at home, the District of Columbia's [new guidance for private cookouts](#) may prove helpful for Montgomery County hosts and guests, too. – *Lee Rucker Keiser, M.S.P.H.*



## CASE STUDY: CONTACT TRACING

Reducing the spread of our 21st century pandemic may increasingly depend on a decades-old public health practice: revisiting newly-diagnosed patients' friends-and-family network. When University of Texas at Austin students' spring break trip to Mexico became a public health emergency upon their return, [swift action in contact tracing](#) successfully minimized community spread of COVID-19, the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) reported June 24. Locally, Montgomery County Health Officer Dr. Travis Gayles informed the County Council on June 23 that 100% of new COVID cases in Maryland's contact-tracing system receive an initial contact within 24 hours, with over 80% resulting in a conversation in that time frame.

However, as [some states scramble](#) to adequately staff their tracing workforce, others are pursuing creative approaches. California [librarians, tax assessors, paralegals and investigators](#) are serving as contact tracers under a state-funded, \$8.7 million program with the Univ. of California-San Francisco. Their goal is to train 20,000 new contact tracers statewide by July. A new [Baltimore Health Corps](#) will recruit, train and employ about 300 currently-jobless residents to serve as contact tracers, care coordinators, and community health workers.

Beyond workforce needs, states are enhancing contact tracing communication, such as Maryland's new [CovidLINK](#) webpage; and Georgia's "[Healthy Georgia Collaborative](#)" 90-second YouTube video. Deployment of contact-tracing technology has prompted concern about privacy of consumer information, the subject of a June letter sent to Apple and Google by Attorneys General of [Maryland](#) and 35 states, plus D.C., Puerto Rico and Guam. Notably, a [University of Arizona](#) app would avoid collecting any personally-identifiable information. - LRK


