INTELLECTUAL AND DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES COMMISSION

FY26 Policy Priorities Montgomery County Council HHS Committee October 16, 2024 Steve Riley, Chair

In 2023, the Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (I/DD) Commission was formed and comprises 25 members, representing a diverse range of stakeholders including individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities, service providers, and representatives from the Commission on People with Disabilities. The Commission's primary focus is on fostering open communication and collaboration among families, support staff, private and public organizations, and the general public regarding programs and services for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

IDDC's Policy Priority Proposal

- 1. The Commission supports policies and programs that focus on outreach to underserved and marginalized members of the Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (I/DD) community, including those that promote Montgomery County as a sensory friendly community, with appropriate levels of County staff support.
 - a. *Outreach to underserved communities*: outreach to underserved and marginalized members of the I/DD community is essential for promoting equity, improving quality of life, building inclusive communities, fulfilling ethical obligations, and leveraging resources effectively. By prioritizing this outreach, our local government can help to create a more just and equitable society for all.
 - b. Create inclusive spaces for these to participate in the community: Kulture City, a national non-profit, spoke at our April 2024 Commission meeting and highlighted the importance of making public spaces, events, and businesses more accessible and welcoming for individuals with sensory sensitivities, many of whom have I/DD. Often people with I/DD may not feel welcomed or able to shop, exist or participate in events or spaces that the general public may find easily accessible.
 - i. A 2018 County Government work group on meeting the needs of residents with developmental disabilities/differences recommended increasing sensory-friendly programming. We propose an addition of a Senior Fellow role within Aging & Disabilities to push this longstanding and recognized priority forward in creating more sensory-friendly spaces and being designated as a sensory-friendly county.

Department of Health and Human Services

- 2. The Commission supports policies designed to ensure a quality and robust Direct Service Professional (DSP) workforce in Montgomery County to support County residents who have I/DD.
 - a. The 2024 Report from the President's Committee for People with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (PCPIDD) highlights the critical shortage of Direct Support Professionals (DSPs) as a major obstacle to providing high-quality Home and Community-Based Services (HCBS) for individuals with I/DD.

The Report recommends investing in training, resources, career advancement opportunities, and competitive compensation and benefits for DSPs to address this crisis. DSPs are essential for helping individuals with I/DD live independently, participate in the workforce, and be active members of their communities. Families also rely on DSPs to provide care and support for their loved ones, allowing them to maintain employment.

b. *Montgomery County DSPs*: Montgomery County residents with I/DD have experienced a shortage of qualified and well-compensated DSPs, which jeopardizes the ability of individuals with I/DD to live fulfilling lives within their communities.

This past year, IDDC's Workforce Development Subcommittee focused on developing solutions to both the current DSP workforce crisis and creating robust and lasting career growth opportunities for current and future DSPs. These solutions centered on opportunities for 'upward mobility,' wage growth to a living wage appropriate to Montgomery County, and professional certification of DSPs that is portable and recognized by any/all Maryland providers of intellectual and/or developmental disabilities supports.

Montgomery County is positioned to address the DSP crisis, with partners like Workforce Montgomery, Montgomery College, and DDA service providers. The I/DD Commission is committed to playing a pivotal role in this effort over the coming year.
