



Alicia Christy U.S. Army - Gulf War and Global War on Terror Veteran

Alicia Christy served as a doctor in the U.S. Army for 22 years during the Gulf War and the Global War on Terror. While on active duty, she served as Chair of the OBGYN department at Walter Reed Army Medical Center (WRAMC) and as a consultant to the Army Surgeon General for Women's Health Issues. She is also the former Deputy Director of Reproductive Health with the VA and a Red Cross volunteer physician at WRAMC.

Dr. Christy has a passion for advocacy with a focus on women veterans and health disparities. In 2020, Dr. Christy received a Humanism in Medicine aware from the American Society of Reproductive Medicine for her advocacy work. In 2021, she received an American Society of Obstetricians and Gynecologists mentor award. Due to her passion for teaching and mentoring, she has continued teaching at the Uniformed Services University after retiring from 20 years of civilian federal service.

As an artist, Dr. Christy has used her artwork to honor women who have served and to bring attention to health disparities. Her portraits "Faces of the Fallen: Women Proudly Served" was part of exhibits hosted at the Library of Congress and Dulles International Airport. She has also had her art featured with the veteran artist non-profit group Uniting US which has had exhibits held at the Library of Congress, Dulles International Airport, National airport, and the British Embassy. At the request from a Maryland Delegate, veteran artists, including Dr. Christy, from United US have painted the portraits of the 128 Maryland residents killed in action during the Global War on Terror. The exhibit is scheduled for January 2025.

Dr. Christy currently resides in Kensington, Maryland.
