Having traffic routed to make a left turn onto Glenallen to get to Randolph seems like it would add frustration to the people who the road is being built for as well as the people who are already residents of the road. Making Eskine a walking/biking path connected to the Glenallen would allow more people to walk to Brookside, horse stables, and the Wheaton Regional Park.
