Focus on Safety and Security



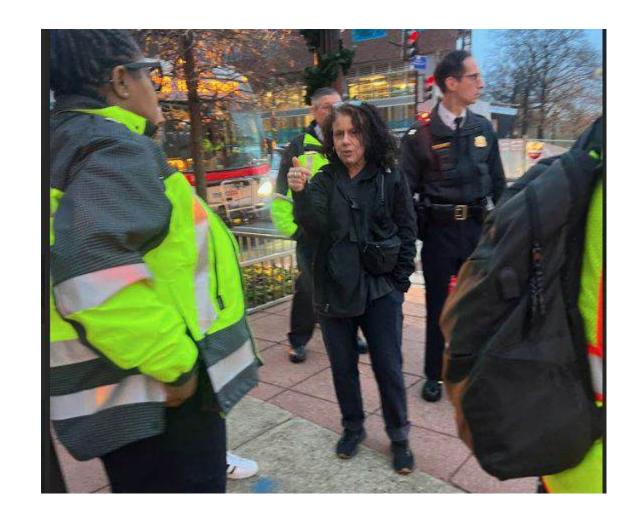

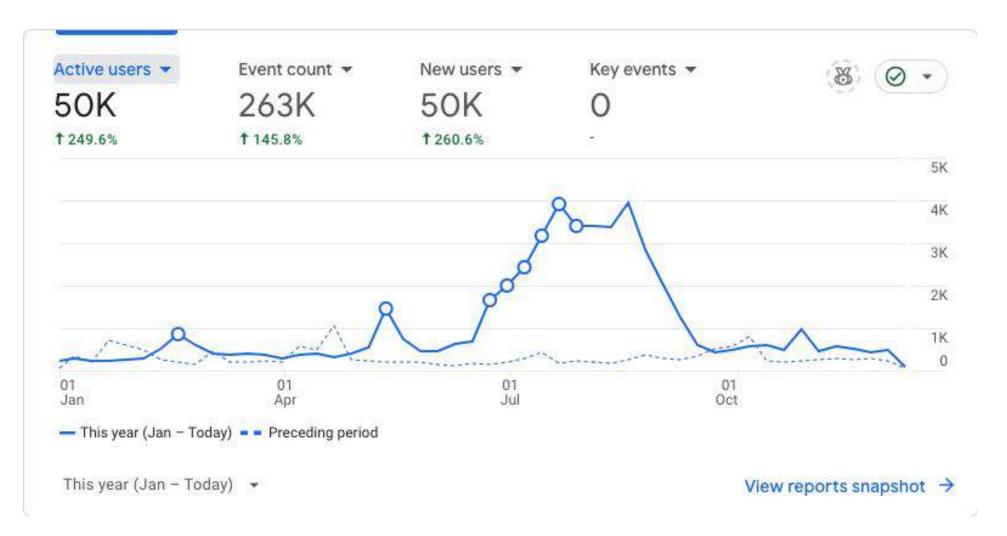
