






The current round of funding adds to two previous rounds of COVID19 assistance.


65% SPENDING TARGET TRACKER









SHELTER RESIDENTS: AVERAGE DAILY COUNT BY WEEK




MC311 WEEKLY CALL VOLUME















VACCINATIONS: CHANGE OVER TIME AND BY AGE GROUP












