My family and I have lived on Westbard Avenue for over 40 years. We have always worked productively with the traffic commission and appreciate the time and effort extended to us to help ensure that the 5500 block of Westbard remains a safe residential block.

Reckless, excessive traffic has been a worsening and continuing problem for our street. Repeated County studies and subsequent efforts to ameliorate the situation have not been successful. Once recent example, of which there are many, occurred when a driver entering Westbard at River Road at such a reckless high rate of speed hit the median strip (installed for the purpose of slowing traffic) so violently that his car was towed away. This median strip also serves as our pedestrian crosswalk for families, children, and pet walkers who come from throughout the entire area including nearby apartments and adjoining neighborhoods.

We applaud the decision the County has made to permanently close Westbard Ave. This decision that was included in the Masterplan addressing the massive redevelopment of Westbard has already taken years of study which determined that this action is appropriate to ensure the safety of all drivers and residents and to protect the residential zoning restrictions that prohibit the volume of traffic that we have endured. To make another important point, please note that even with the obstructed ability to make what is a clearly marked illegal left turn onto westbound River Road, there are countless vehicles so recklessly disregarding the law that they pull into River then drive the wrong side of the road to access the median so they can head west on River. There have been countless accidents at this intersection and absolutely nothing has curtailed illegal left turns.

My family and I applaud the decision the County has already made after thorough studies and with transparency to our Civic Association and County residents that closure is the right thing to do and will ultimately benefit all of our community.

Dear Sir/Madam:

We have been living in our home at since 1996. Over that period we have seen the quality of life and the condition of the street deteriorate due to the heavy volume of traffic, mostly illegal cut-through commuter traffic in the morning and again in the evening.

Commuters flowing down River Rd into DC in the mornings illegally use Westbard Avenue to cut through to Mass Ave and continue their commute into the District. This occurs in spite of a sign on River Rd prohibiting right turns onto Westbard during the morning rush-hour. Scofflaw after scofflaw daily ignores this sign. I have called the Bethesda police station multiple times pointing out these infractions and the police have rarely responded. I recall only one or two instances over the years where the police set up traps to ticket the illegal right-hand turners onto Westbard Ave. In short, there is minimal enforcement. I expect that even with the realigned Westbard Ave, there will still be hundreds of commuters who would rather use old Westbard avoid a traffic light on their way to Mass Ave.

During evening rush-hour traffic these same scofflaws take a right turn onto Westbard Ave from Mass Ave and then ignore the sign at the intersection of Westbard Ave and River Rd prohibiting a very dangerous left turn onto River Rd. to continue their commute. That dangerous turn takes them across two southbound lanes of River Rd to merge with heavy, rush-hour traffic proceeding outbound on River Rd. Even with the realigned Westbard Ave, I anticipate there will still be heavy traffic on the old Westbard Ave to go make an illegal left turn onto River in the hopes of shaving a few seconds of commute time by avoiding a traffic light.

To further discourage commuters from taking the above-mentioned dangerous turn onto River Rd, the county constructed a traffic island on Westbard Ave where it meets River Rd. Once again, I have seen one scofflaw after another ignore a warning sign at Westbard and (the former) Ridgefield, proceed down Westbard, drive around the traffic island and sprint across two lanes of traffic on River Rd to turn left.

Development of the Westbard shopping center is going to include construction of hundreds and hundreds of new residential units and well over a thousand new residents.

There will be 60-70 new townhouses built in the shopping center existing parking lot facing the Kenwood Place Condominium.

The Manor Care lot at the former corner of Westbard and Ridgefield will become a townhouse development with up to 40 units.

The Westwood II site is proposed as an assisted living facility. Perhaps not many cars among the residents, but staff will

bring cars to the neighborhood.

Other construction of hundreds of rental units is planned all along Westbard Ave and also in other areas of the existing shopping center parking lot. The newly realigned Westbard should be able to handle the greatly increased traffic volume heading to/from River Road. There is no good reason to keep the old Westbard and River intersection open as it would serve little useful purpose other than to encourage continuing illegal turns.

I urge the County close the existing Westbard Avenue at its intersection with River Rd. If Westbard is not closed at River Rd, then traffic on Westbard Avenue has the potential to reach increasingly dangerous levels, further pollute the air, make Westbard more unsafe for the young children living here, further raise noise levels, and deteriorate the quality of life both for those now living on Westbard Ave and those who will soon be moving into new homes on the existing Westbard Ave.

My name is Ben Kayden, and I am a resident on the 5500 block of Westbard Avenue. My address is Bethesda, MD. I live here with my wife and our four year old son. We are expecting our second child in October.

My wife and I are providing this written testimony to emphasize how crucial it is for the County to grant the petition to permanently close the 5500 block of Westbard Avenue where it currently meets River Road. When we bought our house in April 2022, it was with the understanding that the intersection of Westbard and River would be closed once the newly aligned Westbard Avenue was finished. We had this understanding because (1) it is clearly and explicitly called for by the 2016 Westbard Sector Plan, (2) it was universally acknowledged that our block, when opened to cut-though traffic, was dangerous to the community, and (3) there would be no logical reason to allow cut-through traffic on our block when Westbard Avenue was being realigned specifically to provide appropriate traffic flow to and from Westbard and River.

Plain and simple, we would not have purchased this home if the Sector Plan did not call for the closure. We relied on the County's strong indication in the Sector Plan that it would close the intersection. If we had appreciated there was a long fight ahead, and the possibility that the County would not follow its Sector Plan, we would not be living in this house because we would not want to subject our children to the noisy and dangerous cut-through traffic that persisted prior to the closure of this block. Right now, although we live with the daily and heavy construction activity right on our door step, we can at least feel comfortable that our son can walk across the street without the risk of large trucks racing dangerously down the road.

While it would be absolutely detrimental to the quality of life and safety on our street if the intersection reopened, as noted above, another salient point is the fact that the intersection is in fact no longer needed. The newly aligned Westbard Avenue was built specifically in order to address traffic flow in this neighborhood. Why would anyone want to subject our residential block to cut-through traffic when there is no reason for it? Please keep in mind that granting our block's petition will not result in some sort of quiet, calm oasis on our street, as we have years of development activity ahead to deal with. Instead, granting the petition will only ensure that the County has lived up to its proposal in the Sector Plan and that we have eliminated an unnecessary, detrimental impact to the 24 families living on our block.

The residents on the 5500 block of Westbard Avenue – that is, the residents most directly impacted by the opening/closure of the intersection – unanimously support the closure. I hope the Councilmembers stand behind us as those most impacted by the petition. We continue to live through the upcoming years of construction in connection with the redevelopment of Westbard Square. If the intersection reopens, our residential street will turn into a highway for the redevelopment, which will totally negate the entire purpose of the Westbard road realignment.

Please lend your support in granting the petition to permanently close the intersection.

I am writing to express my unwavering support for the proposed permanent closure of the old Westbard Avenue-River Road intersection.

Several people who live on the 5500 block of Westbard Avenue are extremely important to me. Our neighbors are our extended family and our Westbard community is incredibly strong and vibrant. This closure will improve traffic safety for motorists, cyclists, and pedestrians by channeling all traffic through the newly realigned Westbard Avenue where there is a traffic signal.

Having spent 18+ years on Westbard Avenue, I can attest to the **urgent need to restrict traffic through this street**. For decades, motorists have sped down this street, ignoring signs, even when there have been parked police cars to monitor its entrance/usage (I have personally witnessed this on several occasions). It is dangerous and reckless and poses a seriously growing threat to the families that live on the street since it's clearly an issue that motorists have chosen to ignore and will continue to unless decisive and permanent action is implemented.

I understand that the permanent closure was agreed upon during the negotiation process back in 2016, and is to be made good/completed after the road realignment is complete. I have been a resident of Westbard Avenue for almost 30 years. I strongly support implementing the 2016 Sector Plan and closing Westbard Ave at River Road.

During the time I have lived on Westbard Ave, several measures have been taken to reduce the volume and speed of cut-through traffic from River Road to the Westbard Shopping Center and beyond to Northwest DC. None of these measures have had much, if any, effect. The "No Right Turn 7-9" sign on River Road is largely ignored (as shown by the large number of cars pulled over by police during sporadic enforcement); the "No Left Turn" sign on Westbard is not at all observed by traffic going onto River Road; and the "No Thru Trucks Over ¾ tons" sign is frequently unheeded by large tractor trailors and other trucks. Physical modifications to the intersection, meant to deter the dangerous left turn onto River Road may have made the intersection even more unsafe.

As these measures were ineffective, in 2016 the Springfield Civic Association supported the closure of Westbard Avenue at River Road, and the Planning Commission included this recommendation in the 2016 Westbard Sector Plan. With the completion of the direct approach to the Westbard Shopping Center nearing completion, now is the time to put this into effect. There is no new motive that I am aware of to ignore the Sector Plan and decline implementation.

The additional residential development and expanded retail at the Westbard shopping Center will produce a large increase in commercial and personal vehicles. The newly aligned Westbard Avenue from River Road to the shopping center will likely take part of this additional traffic. But the temptation for drivers to cut through our residential block to avoid one red traffic light (which can be viewed by drivers travelling eastward on River Road) would be impossible to curb.

Other streets in the Springfield neighborhood will likely benefit from the newly aligned Westbard Avenue, as Ridgefield Rd will no longer be a worthwhile cut-through to the Westbard Shopping Center, and Springfield Rd-Cromwell Drive to Massachusetts Avenue would be a long detour, with the newly aligned Westbard Avenue available. Some residents in Springfield seem to equate closing Westbard and River Road with the road closures and detours in the area during the construction period that generated cut-through traffic in the Springfield neighborhood. Implementing the Sector Plan and closing off the block to cut-through traffic is a very different measure, with no apparent effects on neighboring streets. The County now has an opportunity to make a concrete contribution to pedestrian safety by following through on closing the street, as had been envisioned a few years ago.

I am writing in strong support of the petition to close the intersection between the 5500 block of Westbard Avenue and River Road. With the advent of the apps Waze and GoogleMaps, this intersection has become a common cut through for people traveling to and from the Westbard Shopping Center to River Road and for commuters traveling between Massachusetts Avenue and River Road. Attempts to control traffic along the 5500 block of Westbard have proven ineffectual over the years. Before that portion of Westbard Avenue was closed due to construction, in the morning, cars turned right onto Westbard to cut off a portion of River Road, ignoring the prohibition not to do so between 7 and 9 a.m. Over the years, the few times that there have been police enforcement, many cars were caught in violation of the prohibition, and many more were warned by Waze and GoogleMaps that police cars were in the area, thus negating any future deterrent benefit of having the police there in the first place. Cars and trucks also turn left at the intersection notwithstanding the sign indicating that no left turns are permitted. I have personally been behind many vehicles dangerously turning left onto River Road.

It is unlikely that these issues will be alleviated by the new configuration of Westbard Avenue, because Waze and GoogleMaps will continue to suggest the 5500 block of Westbard and River Road as a preferred shortcut. The heavy traffic that is likely to resume through the 5500 block of Westbard Avenue, if the intersection with River Road is not permanently closed, will cause unnecessary traffic accidents for both pedestrians and drivers.

This letter is to draw the attention of the Montgomery County Government to the importance of the **official petition AB-786** for the permanent closing of the old intersection at Westbard Ave & River Rd. Recent Montgomery County Planning Board Staff Report concluded that both condition of the County Code sections 49-62 are met as per our petition AB-786: Westbard Ave & River Rd intersection is no longer necessary for public use, and closure is necessary to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the residents.

The **2016 Westbard Sector Plan** states: "This Plan endorses the permanent closure of the residential portion of Westbard Avenue between River Road and Ridgefield Road at the River Road end. The closure should not occur until the existing Westbard Road/River Road intersection is realigned to intersect River Road with a right-angled turn. The closed end should have a 3-inch-high mountable curb to allow emergency vehicles to access the block from River Road. The closed end should be reconstructed to create a turnaround. Action on this closure is predicated on the submittal of a formal neighborhood application for street closure in accordance with Chapter 49 of the County Code, and its subsequent approval by the County Council."

Upon the opening of new intersection at River Road and Ridgefield Road, expected in about two months, my wife and I wish to voice our strong support to continuation of the closure of the 5500 Westbard Ave block in order to cut through traffic (which has been in effect since June 2022) by closing the old Westbard Ave & River Rd intersection. The objective of our petition is to limit cut-through traffic on our residential block as approved in the 2016 Westbard Sector Plan and multiple subsequent approvals including the realignment of Westbard Ave & Ridgefield Rd. The newly aligned River Road Ave & Ridgefield Rd intersection will have safer permanent turning lanes and stoplights for entry to/from River Road, and is the intended route for cut-through traffic to use.

The old intersection of Westbard Ave & River Rd was dangerous with speeding vehicles from River Road, a 4-lane divided highway where speed limit is often ignored. From that traffic pattern vehicles including trucks were making sudden turn to residential road Westbard Ave. with a blind spot and no stoplight at the intersection. Since my house is located near the intersection of Westbard Ave. and River Road I observed that many drivers ignore existing "no left turn" sign to River Road; hence, a belief that placing new traffic signs on the intersection will resolve the problem and prevent new traffic accidents is unrealistic and simply will not work. I have been living with my wife on this address for 25 years - long enough to witness multiple vehicle accidents when trying to make right turns from River Road on Westbard Ave, and road backups from vehicles trying to turn left on River Road from Westbard Ave. Furthermore, these vehicles continue to speed on the 5500 Westbard Ave block, jeopardizing the safety of the residents, which include many children and elderly adults. I understand that MC Department of Transportation has already conducted recent studies, both in 2017 and 2020, with the results confirming the dangerous issues on the 5500 Westbard Ave. block.

My wife and I together with my neighbors in the 5500 Westbard Ave. block count on Montgomery County understanding of our legitimate concerns and expect MC support of our petition AB-786 to permanently close Westbard Ave. at River Road.

Dear Ms. McCray:

I have lived at the corner of 24 years (my wife and her parents lived in it the previous 27 years). I am writing on behalf of wife, Penelope Mickum, and myself to oppose permanent closure of Westbard Road at River Road. Please include this letter as part of the AB 786 hearing record.

This letter opposes implementation of AB 786, which would result in permanent closure of Westbard Avenue at River Road. By any calculus, consideration of permanent closure is premature and unwarranted. No decision regarding closure at River Road should be made until the County has time to study the new traffic patterns and evaluate them. On a more fundamental level, the County's default position should always be to keep streets open, absent pressing, demonstrable need. There has been no such showing. The new design was designed to alleviate the back-ups that that caused traffic problems on the 5500 block of Westbard. My understanding is that the 5500 block would flow on to a feeder street (the same for Ridgefield Road) before accessing the new roadway, making cut through traffic all the more unlikely.

At a minimum, data is necessary to evaluate whether e newly-realigned Westbard Avenue, which allows River Road traffic to go left at River and (what used to be) Ridgefield Road (extended), without stopping at the light and allows sufficient space for the large, 18-wheeler trucks to turn left without causing the back-ups that caused drivers to cut through the 5500 block in the first place. It may well be that the new design completely alleviates traffic on the 5500 block of Westbard Avenue, thereby obviating the problem entirely. At this time, the County cannot answer this question.

The County must evaluate the impact permanent closure of Westbard Avenue at River Road would have on adjacent streets like Ogden, Springfield, Cromwell, Devonshire, and the Springfield neighborhood in general before any decision is made. As above, any such study should allow for the establishment of new traffic patterns and the impact of forthcoming residential construction related to Westbard Square.

No one contests that recent detours have changed traffic patterns in the Springfield neighborhood, causing traffic problems. In recognition of these problems, quantifiable data should be obtained and evaluated before closing off the ingress and egress of a neighborhood road permanently. Recent examples of problems include (1) the closing of Westbard Avenue initially diverted thousands of vehicles per day, including heavy trucks, to Ridgefield Road, a situation alleviated only by making Ridgefield Road temporarily one way; (2) the changes in traffic patterns due to the Westbard Avenue closure have imposed an unacceptable cut-through traffic burden on Ogden Road, a small street with limited capacity. Recent review indicates that over 80% of this Ogden Road cut-through traffic has been speeding, presenting a safety hazard; and (3) the Westbard Avenue closure has shifted additional traffic to Springfield Drive and

Cromwell Drive. This situation is potentially hazardous because Wood Acres Elementary School is located one block away, and children walk the street on their way to school. Further impacting Wood Acres Elementary School, cut-through traffic from River Road also turns left on Devonshire (closer to the light at Goldsborough), where traffic wends its way to Cromwell, where drivers turn right to get to MacArthur Blvd, passing directly in front of the school in the process.

The County also needs to assess the impact that new residential development will have on the neighborhood. The proposed new development includes a senior living center with 90 parking spaces and, more significantly, more 300+ condominiums and townhomes in Westbard Square and on what has been the lower, extended Ridgefield Road at River Road. This new construction will significantly increase traffic volume in the area of Westbard Avenue, and is likely to affect traffic conditions on surrounding streets. Closing Westbard Avenue at River Road should be evaluated only after new residential density has been considered and taken into account.

The petition to permanently close Westbard Avenue at River Road was submitted by a group representing the 24 homes on the 5500 block of Westbard Avenue. The Springfield Civic Association, which represents the approximately 650 homes in the Springfield neighborhood — including the 5500 block of Westbard Avenue — was not informed of the road closure petition and was not consulted in its drafting. The Springfield Civic Association and the residents of Springfield should be given an opportunity to express their views on AB 786 before this consequential decision is made.

Again, my wife and I oppose AB 786 as premature for the reasons set forth above. Additional traffic studies to assess the impact of the realigned Westbard Avenue and traffic associated with the opening of the new Giant store should be undertaken. Additional County studies should include estimates of the traffic impact of significant residential development at and near Westbard Square. These studies are a necessary predicate to evaluate whether AB 786 would adversely affect the Springfield neighborhood. In addition, the views of the Springfield Civic Association and the residents of the broader Springfield community should be fully considered.

The Honorable Mssrs. Paylor, Conklin, Friedson and Elrich,

I live on Springfield Drive, the first home off River Road. I am very familiar with the increased traffic that has been brought to my street by the Westbard development work. By comparison, another street close to Springfield Drive, Westbard Avenue, is wide enough to have easy parking on both sides of that street and plenty of auto travel space between the parking's solid white lines and double yellow lines. MDOT is considering a petition to permanently close Westbard Avenue at River Road. We strongly oppose this request. If Westbard Avenue at River Road were to remain closed once Ridgefield Road is reopened, Ridgefield Road and the adjacent cross-streets mentioned previously will again see a significant increase in cut-through traffic. The reasons Westbard residents are seeking relief from cut-through traffic are equally (if not more) applicable to residents on and near Ridgefield Road. Yet by requesting permanent closure of Westbard at River, Westbard residents are seeking to unfairly place ALL of the traffic burden on residents on and near Ridgefield Road, Springfield Drive, Cromwell Drive and Ogden Road. Public Safety considerations alone should dissuade MDOT from closing Westbard. Over 40 school aged children live along Ridgefield Road between Springfield and Westbard, and countless more walk daily to bus stops on Ridgefield Road. Ridgefield and its nearby cross-streets have three bus stops (none are on Westbard between Ridgefield and River) and closure would again place numerous school children in the middle of this unsafe traffic pattern. Elementary

school children walk to Woodacres Elementary School along Ridgefield Road and its cross streets as well as along Springfield Drive and Cromwell Drive. Pedestrian and bicycle

Ridgefield Road is <u>not wide enough</u> to handle such traffic as <u>it is barely 27 feet wide</u> and contains several curves and hills – whereas Westbard is a <u>four-lane 45 feet wide</u> straight "AVENUE." It is by far the widest street in the Springfield neighborhood. Yet the closure of Westbard at River Road will keep traffic off of this significantly safer Avenue and force traffic onto narrower winding roads where pedestrians will be at significant risk. In order to ensure that ALL residents of Springfield on roads that will be affected by cutthrough traffic heading to and from Westbard Square are as safe as possible, we urge you to move on the following:

- 1. WESTBARD AVENUE REMAIN PERMANENTLY OPEN AT RIVER ROAD, OR
- 2. AT A MINIMUM, WESTBARD AVENUE REMAIN OPEN AT RIVER ROAD PENDING A FULL EVALUATION OF TRAFFIC AND POTENTIAL ADDITIONAL ROAD SAFETY MEASURES, WHICH EVALUATION SHALL BE CONDUCTED NO EARLIER THAN THE COMPLETION OF CONSTRUCTION OF THE WESTBARD SQUARE SHOPPING CENTER AND TOWNHOMES, AND
- 3. IN ANY EVENT, TRAFFIC SAFETY MEASURES BE IMPLEMENTED TO SLOW AND DETER TRAFFIC IN THE SPRINGFIELD NEIGHBORHOOD



I hope this letter finds you in good health and high spirits. My name is Hassan Javadi Tabrizi, and I am writing to you as a long-standing resident of the 5500 block of Westbard Avenue. Having moved to Montgomery County from Piedmont, California 32 years ago, I bought a home at and established roots for my family. In that time, my wife Nahid and I have grown to cherish our home and our neighborhood and we have dutifully paid our dues and taxes over all these years.

My wife and I are now over 80 years old. In these advanced years, we find ourselves facing some challenges that have prompted me to reach out to you for assistance. I was diagnosed with Parkinson's disease 6 years ago, and for health reasons, my daily walks on my street are essential for my physical and mental well-being. Given my condition, I require a quiet and safe environment to navigate in and it is in my best health interest that the road closure from Westbard onto River road be made permanent. Additionally, I should like you to know that my wife is also struggling with hearing issues and the constant traffic noise will pose a noticeable threat to her hearing health.

Furthermore, our responsibilities extend beyond our own needs. We occasionally care for our two young grandsons, whose safety is of paramount importance to us as well as the safety of other small children on our street. Unfortunately, the incessant traffic and its inherent risks will certainly jeopardize their well-being and safety.

It has come to my attention that the residents of our block have submitted a collective letter outlining the concerns of our community. For decades, the 5500 block of Westbard Avenue has borne the brunt of cut-through traffic, resulting in unsafe conditions, sleep disturbances, and numerous traffic accidents and recorded incidents. I live in Woodacres in Bethesda, MD. I strongly oppose the application from 5500 Westbard Avenue Block Civic Association (the "Applicant"), for the permanent closure of a public right of way at the northwestern terminus of Westbard Avenue at River Road in the Westbard area of Bethesda.

I request this comment be made part of the hearing record.

The application is fatally flawed because it improperly fails to consider (1) safety; (2) efficiency; (3) environmental impacts; and (4) wasteful disregard of tax dollars.

First, permanent closure impairs safety of pedestrians, bikers, and especially children because vehicular traffic that would normally travel down River and turn into the new Westbard will -- if the application is granted -- take a "shortcut" or diversion through Springfield Drive. My name is Julie Satterfield. My husband and I are the homeowners of the satter was a lived in this house for more than 25 years. Our home is exactly at the crossroads of Westbard Avenue and Ridgefield Road. We have witnessed cut-thru speeding commuters morning and evening for years.

I would like to add my voice of strong support for the proposed permanent closure of the old Westbard Avenue - River Road intersection. Permanent closure of this intersection will improve traffic safety for motorists—particularly those on River Road who are often put in a highly dangerous situation by the illegal turners coming out of the old Westbard—and cyclists and pedestrians by appropriately channeling all traffic through the newly realigned and enhanced Westbard Avenue about 300 meters (less than ¼ mile) away. There is a traffic signal at the newly realigned Westbard Avenue, and no traffic signal at the old Westbard - River intersection. The newly realigned road has vastly improved visibility, accessibility, pedestrian accommodations, is much safer for all users and clearly fits with Montgomery County's Vision Zero policy. Trucks in particular will have no need to try to enter or exit the old Westbard Avenue - River Road intersection again.

It is my understanding that Montgomery County negotiated the permanent closure of the old Westbard - River intersection with residents in 2016. Residents were assured at the time this closure would happen after completion of the road realignment project. I want to be able to trust that my local government will adhere to its past promises, as well as those it will make in the future.

It is my strong belief that closure of the old Westbard - River Road intersection will cause no added traffic burden whatsoever to other neighbors in our community. There will be no reason for any driver on River Road to travel to the Giant shopping center other than by the newly realigned road. For example, drivers are not going to be turning on Springfield and then turn left to drive all the way down Ridgefield to get to Giant. This route and similar supposed cutthru routes will be overly cumbersome detours and make little driving sense. The new road from River Road to Westbard will have 5 lanes' width, a traffic signal, very wide sidewalks, and excellent lighting. The intersection which the petition seeks to close does not favorably compare on safety features. Gentlemen,

I know there is strong campaign of the residents of Westbard Avenue to close their street to all traffic (except that belonging to the residents of their street).

As one of many residents whose streets would be negative affected by such a closure, I am opposed to that proposal.

First, There is NO NEED for the Westbard closure. Like all of us, the proponents of that closure would like less traffic on their street. But that does not justify closing the street! The only reasons I've seen are (1)that they were told/promised that it would happen and (2) that they fear an increase in truck traffic. These are weak reasons that don't justify closing a main street.

Second, When a street is closed, the traffic doesn't just disappear; it moves onto other streets. People on Ridgefield, Ogden, and Springfield are constantly complaining about the increase in traffic on their streets too. (In fact there is talk of people on Odgen Road wanting to close their access to and from River Road too!) It is not feasible to close streets just because people want less traffic. The overflow traffic will just move to other neighborhood streets.

Closing the portion of Westbard that connects River and Ridgefield would certainly create a peaceful street for those 25 residents, but it would set a dangerous precedent and create a domino effect with increased traffic on at least three other neighborhood streets.

Good afternoon, everyone. I'm Phillip Pradier, the President of the Board of Directors at Kenwood Place Condominium, Today, I'm here to represent our Association and all our homeowners. I want to be unequivocal: We are adamantly against the proposed closure of the northern section of Westbard Avenue at River Road. We strongly urge the Department of Transportation to reject this application.

Our Condominium Association shares the most extensive property border with the upcoming Westbard Square development. Our building comprises 174 condominium units, including six commercial units that house small businesses. Currently, our community consists of around 400 residents. However, the neighborhood's population will increase by 750 additional people upon completing the new development and associated housing.

I am writing to request a denial of the 5500 Westbard Avenue Block Civic Association's request to permanently close Westbard Avenue at River Road near the Westbard Square construction.

This biased petition by this unsanctioned "Civic Association" serves only one purpose: selfishly shield themselves from *any and all* traffic expected by the eventual opening of the new Westbard Square, by putting significantly more residents, pedestrians, and children in harms way.

We, residents of Montgomery County, rely on you to represent our needs. The Springfield Civic Association, which represents and includes the 5500 Block of the Westbard Avenue, submitted the <u>following letter</u> to the planning board to block this drastic and unfair measure. Furthermore, the Planning Staff's professional recommendation also suggested delaying closure until after the realignment of Westbard Avenue is completed in order to study this intersection and to respond appropriately to updated traffic patterns (see <u>Staff Report</u>). Why would you entertain the "5500 Westbard Avenue Block Civic Association" over the Springfield Civic Association (which includes Westbard avenue between River and Ridgefield) and your own Planning Staff?

Due to the road closures of Westbard Ave at River Road and River Road last year, the Springfield neighborhood - especially Ridgefield Road, Springfield Drive, Cromwell Road and Ogden Road - had been inundated with a constant stream of trucks and a large volume of commuter vehicles trying to access the open part of Westbard Avenue to either get to the Westbard Square or Massachusetts Ave. The detour plan directing commuters/trucks to use Goldsboro or Little Falls Parkway or to Massachusetts to Westbard Avenue had in effect failed to divert the traffic away from the neighborhood, and county police have confirmed their inability to enforce the detour plan. Ridgefield Road, a narrow and hilly residential street, without permit parking required to park on either side of the street, was bearing the brunt

of the cut through traffic, making it difficult to leave homes and creating unsafe conditions for pedestrians and children.

On the contrary, Westbard Avenue is a flat, 45 feet wide road, with permit parking on both sides and numerous speed bumps. It has clear line demarcations separating sides of the road, and is undeniably better equipped to handle this volume of traffic without putting pedestrians, children, or vehicles in harms way.

Westbard Ave at River Road should be permanently reopened at the very least so that Ridgefield, Springfield, Cromwell, Ogden and Westbard are *equally* sharing the volume of traffic during the road realignment.

By requesting permanent closure of Westbard at River, Westbard residents are seeking to unfairly place *all* of the traffic burden on residents on and near Ridgefield Road, Springfield Drive, Cromwell Drive, and Ogden Road.

Public safety measures alone should dissuade MDOT from closing Westbard at River. Over 40 school aged children live along Ridgefield Road between Springfield and Westbard. Ridgefield and neighboring streets have three bus stops (Westbard has none) and placing numerous children in the middle of unsafe traffic patterns (evidenced last year) is unfounded. There are significantly more houses impacted on Ridgefield, Cromwell, Springfield, and Ogden than on Westbard. Not to mention, most neighborhood pedestrians utilize Ridgefield Road between Springfield and Westbard to access the Westbard Square shopping center.

Closing this road will *also* lead to an inundation of random civic associations petitioning self-serving measures. For example, what's to stop the creation of a "Springfield Drive Civic Association" from petitioning closure of Springfield Road between Cromwell and River Roads? What's to stop "Ridgefield Road Civic Association" from unanimously petitioning for permanent closure of the Ridgefield at Westbard? When will it end?

I would like to strongly disagree with any effort to permanently close Westbard Ave at River Rd. The temporary closure has placed a burden on me and I assume many of my neighbors in terms of reaching the Westbard Giant and adjacent shops . If this were made permanent, I believe it would adversely affect both the commercial stores there and the community. The primary problem is much of the traffic from River Rd would be directed onto Little Falls Parkway which has recently been narrowed , has had its speed limit lowered and has had three new speed bumps added. Clearly, this is an effort to slow and lessen traffic on this road between River and Massachusetts Aves. These recent changes may have been necessitated in part because of increased traffic due to the temporary Westbard closure . Furthermore, it makes sense for there to be more than one significant way to get into the new Westbard commercial area- but this plan funnels traffic onto residential streets (Massachusetts Ave , and also Western Ave) rather than River - which is highly commercial for several blocks right around that area.

In addition, exiting Westbard onto Massachusetts is a problem if going north or west from that area. For several hours in the morning and again in the late afternoon, there is a "no left turn "sign onto Little Falls heading back to River. One has to either travel much farther up Massachusetts to Westmorland Circle (which is crowded and tricky for many to navigate) and then across Western Avenue - already heavily used and again, residential. The other choice is to make a u- turn on Massachusetts (dangerous) or cut through a residential neighborhood. I should add that i don't live on these streets or in the potential cut-through neighborhood but rather close to Friendship Heights.

However, I have used that Giant rarely during this period and would be discouraged from using it in the future if this were a permanent change. I'm not sure who this change would benefit - but it's not the residents or stores in this area.

We, the undersigned residents of the Springfield community of Bethesda, MD, who each live on or adjacent to Ridgefield Road, Springfield Drive, Cromwell Drive and Ogden Road, submit this petition and seek the following relief.

The redevelopment of Westbard Square and the closure of Westbard Avenue at River Road for the last year during the redevelopment process brought about tremendous traffic and road hazards to the Springfield community of Bethesda.

Springfield residents, especially those living on and near the above-mentioned streets, were subjected to horrific and dangerous traffic conditions during redevelopment. Those circumstances have been well-documented and described to the Planning Board, Regency, and MDOT. MDOT repeatedly rejected requests to improve the safety conditions in the Springfield neighborhood.

Residents of Springfield continue to be very concerned about the volume and types of transportation that travel through our narrow, suburban roads, where homes with children and school bus stops are located.

Now, MDOT is considering a petition to permanently close Westbard Avenue at River Road. We strongly oppose this request. If Westbard Avenue at River Road were to remain closed once Ridgefield Road is reopened, Ridgefield Road and the adjacent cross-streets mentioned previously will again see a significant increase in cut-through traffic.

The reasons Westbard residents are seeking relief from cut-through traffic are equally (if not more) applicable to residents on and near Ridgefield Road. Yet by requesting permanent closure of Westbard at River, Westbard residents are seeking to unfairly place ALL of the traffic burden on residents on and near Ridgefield Road, Springfield Drive, Cromwell Drive and Ogden Road.

Public Safety considerations alone should dissuade MDOT from closing Westbard. Over 40 school aged children live along Ridgefield Road between Springfield and Westbard, and countless more walk daily to bus stops on Ridgefield Road. Ridgefield and its nearby cross-streets have three bus stops (none are on Westbard between Ridgefield and River) and closure would again place numerous school children in the middle of this unsafe traffic pattern. Elementary school children walk to Woodacres Elementary School along Ridgefield Road and its cross streets as well as along Springfield Drive and Cromwell Drive. Pedestrian and bicycle

traffic to Westbard Square as well as the Capital Crescent Trail travel on Ridgefield Rd.

Ridgefield Road is not wide enough to handle such traffic as it is barely 27 feet wide and contains several curves and hills — whereas Westbard is a four-lane 45 feet wide straight "AVENUE." It is by far the widest street in the Springfield neighborhood. Yet the closure of Westbard at River Road will keep traffic off of this significantly safer Avenue and force traffic onto narrower winding roads where pedestrians will be at significant risk.

In order to ensure that ALL residents of Springfield on roads that will be affected by cut-through traffic heading to and from Westbard Square are as safe as possible, we petition that:

- 1. WESTBARD AVENUE REMAIN PERMANENTLY OPEN AT RIVER ROAD, OR
- 2. AT A MINIMUM, WESTBARD AVENUE REMAIN OPEN AT RIVER ROAD PENDING A FULL EVALUATION OF TRAFFIC AND POTENTIAL ADDITIONAL ROAD SAFETY MEASURES, WHICH EVALUATION SHALL BE CONDUCTED NO EARLIER THAN THE COMPLETION OF CONSTRUCTION OF THE WESTBARD SQUARE SHOPPING CENTER AND TOWNHOMES, AND

I write today in my personal capacity as a decades-long resident of Ridgefield Road in the Springfield neighborhood of Bethesda. Please include this letter in the AB 786 hearing record.

<u>Closure is Premature</u>. This letter is to oppose AB 786, the permanent closure of Westbard Avenue at River Road, as premature. A decision on AB 786 should not be made until traffic studies have:

1)Evaluated the effectiveness of the realigned Westbard Avenue in diverting traffic from the 5500 block of Westbard Avenue, the block abutting Westbard Avenue at River Road. This evaluation should be conducted, at minimum, several months following the completion of the Westbard Avenue realignment and the opening of the new Giant at Westbard Square -- that is, in mid-2024 or later -- in order to account for the establishment of new traffic patterns. The impact of forthcoming residential construction related to Westbard Square (see below) should also be considered.

2)Evaluated the probable impact of the permanent closure of Westbard Avenue at River Road on adjacent streets and on the Springfield neighborhood generally. Again, such studies should await the establishment of new traffic patterns following the completion of the Westbard Avenue realignment and the opening of the new Giant at Westbard Square (mid-2024 or later.) As noted later in this letter, the impact of forthcoming residential construction related to Westbard Square should also be considered.

<u>Springfield Neighborhood Traffic Problems</u>. The key reason to oppose the closure of Westbard Avenue at River Road at this time is the fact that recent detours have caused substantial and continuing traffic problems in the Springfield neighborhood. In light of these problems, careful study is needed before closing another through street. Recent problems include the following:

- •The closing of Westbard Avenue initially diverted thousands of vehicles per day, including heavy trucks, to Ridgefield Road, a situation alleviated only by making Ridgefield Road temporarily one way.
- •The changes in traffic patterns due to the Westbard Avenue closure have imposed an unacceptable cut-through traffic burden on Ogden Road, a small street with limited capacity. Recent review indicates that over 80% of the Ogden Road cut-through traffic has been speeding, presenting a safety hazard.
- •The Westbard Avenue closure has shifted additional traffic to Cromwell Drive. This situation is potentially hazardous because Wood Acres Elementary School is located there.

Assess Impact of New Residential Development. The new Westbard Square development, scheduled for completion in 2026, will include a senior living center with 90 parking spaces and, more significantly, 300+ condominiums and townhomes in Westbard Square and on what has been lower Ridgefield Road at River Road. This new construction will significantly increase traffic volume in the area of Westbard Avenue, and could affect traffic conditions on surrounding streets. The impact of closing Westbard Avenue at River Road should be evaluated in the context of this new residential density.

<u>Lack of Neighborhood Representation</u>. The petition to permanently close Westbard Avenue at River Road was submitted by a group representing only the 24 or so homes on the 5500 block of Westbard Avenue. The Springfield Civic

Association, which represents the approximately 650 homes in the Springfield neighborhood — including the 5500 block of Westbard Avenue — was not informed of the road closure petition and was not consulted in its drafting. The Springfield Civic Association and the residents of Springfield should be given an opportunity to express their views on AB 786 before this consequential decision is made.

Thank you for your attention to this letter. Again, I oppose AB 786 as premature. Additional traffic studies should be conducted in mid-2024 or later, to assess the impact of the realigned Westbard Avenue and traffic associated with the opening of the new Giant store. Additional evaluation should including forward-looking estimates of the traffic impact of forthcoming residential development at and near Westbard Square. These studies are needed to evaluate whether AB 786 would adversely affect the Springfield neighborhood. In addition, the views of the Springfield Civic Association and the residents of the broader Springfield community should be fully considered.

Also known as 5500 Westbard Avenue Block Civic Association's request to permanently close Westbard Avenue at River Road is unfair to the rest of the neighborhood and for that reason untenable.

Last year, due to the road closures of Westbard Ave at River Road, the residents of Ridgefield Road, overwhelmingly bore the brunt. Trucks, large volume of commuter vehicles and never-ending vehicles cut through Ridgefield Road trying to access the open part of Westbard Avenue to either get to the Westbard Square or Massachusetts Ave. The results:

- 1) It made it very difficult to leave my home and get out of my driveway.
- 2) The cut through vehicles were very impatient, either they ignored the NO TRUN ON RED sign, then made an illegal turn creating unsafe conditions for pedestrians, children or bikers.
- 3) or the drivers were pressing the car horns pushing the cars in front of them to make a turn on red. The constant annoying car horns noise can be harmful and take a toll on individual health, increasing cholesterol, blood pressure and heart rate.
- 4) Ridgefield Road and neighboring streets have three bus stops. During school years, 3 pick ups in the morning and 3 drop offs in the afternoon for elementally, middle and high schools children that put numerous children in the middle of unsafe traffic patterns, it is very wrong.
- 5) Westbard Avenue is THE widest street in the Springfield neighborhood with double yellow lines and sidewalks on both sides. All other streets in Springfield are narrower, without any sidewalks and witness heavy pedestrian or bicycle traffic.

Thank you for both of your and other colleagues time in listening to all of the residents of the 5500 Westbard Ave block and other interested parties regarding our **5500 Westbard Ave Block Civic Association's Petition for the PERMANENT CLOSURE OF WESTBARD AVENUE AT RIVER ROAD AB-786**.

My name is Michael Chen-Young, a 25-year resident at what one could call "Ground Zero" of this "old" intersection of Westbard Ave, as my home is directly at this corner of this work been an active community members and advocates for our entire neighborhood, constructively engaged with multiple stakeholders in helping craft the balanced outcome of the 2016 Westbard Sector Plan and the many subsequent hearings in its enactment. I most recently testified at the MC Planning Board hearing on Thursday July 27, 2023, again stressing the importance of this road closure to protect the residents of our short residential block who face the disparate impact from the dangerous cut-through trucks and cars. I am signed up to again testify in this Tuesday's MCDOT hearing under Executive Order No. 136-23.

I try to approach any topic, especially one for which people may be passionate, with a calm and respectful mindset, and to clarify the facts of the matter in simple terms. The short presentation attached to the email will be the basis of my testimony on Tuesday, which focuses on the primary facts surrounding the debate, namely the only possible usages of the "old" Westbard Ave & River Rd intersection, namely:

- 1) Intersection Use Case #1: Eastbound River Road cut-through vehicles wanting to turn right on Westbard Ave
- 2) Intersection Use Case #2: Northbound Westbard Ave cut-through vehicles heading towards River Rd while comparing to the alternative usage of the "new" intersection with River Road only ~10 seconds away intended to handle the dangerous cut-through trucks and cars.

Please find the attached supporting testimony reflective of the above approach that I will use in Tuesday's hearing:

I've also read most of the letters of opposition (and know many of these neighbors). I know many of the Springfield Civic Association (SCA)'s Board members and was a part of the SCA Traffic Committee through August 2022. It's unfortunate that there isn't 100% alignment on this matter, and when you speak to many, it's primarily due to other upper neighborhood streets experiencing an increase in cut-through traffic during the road re-alignment construction and feeling the 5500 Westbard Ave block is reason for their cut-through traffic, and as such, re-opening the "old" Westbard Ave & River Rd intersection is only fair without factoring in the disparate impact on us and that the "new" intersection only ~10 seconds away was designed to take the cut-through traffic.

Thus, some Springfield residents, notably none of which live on the 5500 Westbard Ave block hence don't seem to fully understand the issue, have opposed the Westbard Sector Plan 2016 enactment to close this old dangerous "old" Westbard Ave & River Rd intersection forever. They wrongly cast the scenario as "Westbard residents are seeking to unfairly place ALL of the traffic burden on residents on and near Ridgefield Road, Springfield Drive, Cromwell Drive and Ogden Road" while also asking that "in any event, traffic safety measures be implemented to slow and deter traffic in the Springfield neighborhood [of which Westbard Ave is a part]".

But when one moves away from just fear, and looks at the facts of the only possible uses of the "old" intersection to turn from River Rd on to Westbard Ave and vice versa, the though process becomes clearer. Clear thinking recognizes the danger of this "old" intersection and that it was intended to be replaced by the better "new" intersection only ~10 seconds away. The outcome should be the same as found in the thoughtful Westbard Sector Plan, supported by the MC Planning Board's recent votes 5-0 in favor of the closure even temporarily while MCDOT researches the permanent closure. The MC Planning Board Staff experts confirmed that that the "full or partial closure of Westbard Avenue meets the necessary findings for Section 49-63" and concluded that this "old" Westbard Ave & River Rd intersection is both:

- 1) no longer necessary for public use, and
- 2) closure is necessary to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the residents

I personally walked through with several SCA Board members these facts, and none of them could disagree with the facts and use cases. And that's why you do not see <u>any</u> opposing letter to our petition try to argue on the facts, but instead the approach is a familiar DC-area "slow no" by "asking for a study, after all construction in complete several years in the future."

We hope our county decision makers will instead look at the facts, and protect the residents of the 5500 Westbard Ave block face the disparate impact from the dangerous cut-through trucks and cars going through this "old" dangerous intersection. The enactment of the Westbard Sector Plan 2016 to close this "old" Westbard Ave & River Rd dangerous intersection and re-direct traffic to the "new" intersection on ~10 seconds away will result in improved traffic measures for Westbard Ave and the overall Springfield neighborhood.



Intersection Use Case #1: Eastbound River Road view of cut-through vehicles wanting to turn right on Westbard Ave

A long due process has occurred between ALL parties – residents, developers, MCDOT, MC Planning Board, and MC Councilmembers leading to the compromises in the Westbard Sector Plan 2016. Subsequent hearings and approvals of realignment plans to build the "new" intersection removed the need for this "old" dangerous intersection.



"New" intersection only ~10 seconds further east on River Rd:

- Designed to make the "old" dangerous intersection obsolete
- Permanent curved turning lane to handle trucks and cars
- Stop-light which enables better traffic control
- Upon turning right, multi-lane on to Westbard Ave to reach either the newly construction at Westbard Square, or continuing to Massachusetts Ave

"Old" dangerous Westbard Ave intersection:

- 1) partially blind intersection (with multiple accidents) for vehicles traveling east on River Rd <u>after having passed the Springfield</u> Dr intersection that has a stop-light
- 2) by the time drivers reach this "old" intersection, they are often still speeding above the 35 MPH limit
- 3) multiple studies with history of illegal turns at this "old" intersection by large trucks and cars, despite signage restrictions

Path A: cut-through vehicles turn left to drive through the "old' 5500 Westbard Ave residential block, only to find "No Left Turn" Path B: cut-through vehicles keep straight with 2 lanes to the nearer "new" intersection to a stoplight supporting safe Left turns

Path A: Turn left to drive through the "old" 5500 Westbard Ave residential block to get to the "old" intersection at River Rd, only to find the "No Left Turn"

- Once vehicles get to that "No Left Turn" at the "old" intersection, they will either
- (a) try to ignore the sign and make the dangerous left turn into the blind speeding traffic, or
- (b) try to perform a dangerous U-turn to head back the other way on the residential block (with more speed), or
- (c) queue in a long backup of vehicles to make the only legal right-turn on River Rd which takes them back to the "new intersection" but heading in the opposite desired direction, forcing dangerous U-turns on River Rd




Path B: "New" intersection straight ahead


The 5500 Westbard Ave residential block will be disparately impacted if the closure doesn't occur

When you are reviewing the request submitted by the residents of the 5500 block of Westbard Avenue it will be irresponsible to not take into account the views of the other nearby residents, particularly those on Ridgefield Rd, who will be severely impacted by the closure request. I'm sure that is not your intent, but from what I've heard so far the review might be going in that direction. One block does not constitute a neighborhood. I think we all have questions and concerns over the traffic in the area so the views of one block of residents should not take precedence over the rest of the neighborhood. An overall neighborhood approach should be taken for traffic management.

My husband and I fully support the issues being raised by the Springfield Citizen Association and in addition would also like to raise the following concerns.

Hello,

I would like to register my opposition to the permanent closure of Westbard Avenue at River Road.

Due to the road closures of Westbard Ave at River Road and Ridgefield Road last year, the Springfield neighborhood - especially Ridgefield Road, Springfield Drive, Cromwell Road and Ogden Road - had been inundated with a constant stream of trucks and a large volume of commuter vehicles trying to access the open part of Westbard Avenue to either get to the Westbard Square or Massachusetts Ave. The detour plan directing commuters/trucks to use Goldsboro or Little Falls Parkway or to Massachusetts to Westbard Avenue had in effect failed to divert the traffic away from the neighborhood, and county police have confirmed their inability to enforce the detour plan. Ridgefield Road, a narrow and hilly residential street, without permit parking required to park on either side of the street, was bearing the brunt of the cut through traffic, making it difficult to leave homes and creating unsafe conditions for pedestrians and children.

On the contrary, Westbard Avenue is a flat, 45 foot wide road, with permit parking on both sides and numerous speed bumps. It has clear line demarcations separating sides of the road, and is undeniably better equipped to handle this volume of traffic without putting pedestrians, children, or vehicles in harm's way.

To Tiara McCray and Montgomery County DOT:

I am writing in support of the petition by the residents of the 5500 block of Westbard Avenue who would like to see their street closed at the intersection of River Road and Westbard Avenue. In order to prevent confusion, I will be referring to the realigned portion of Westbard Avenue as "new Westbard Avenue" and the 5500 block of Westbard Avenue as "old Westbard Avenue."

From 2014-2017 I was president of the Springfield Civic Association. From the fall of 2014 until July 2016, the Westbard sector plan was under review by the Planning Board and the County Council, when it was finally adopted. Of particular concern to the residents of old Westbard Avenue was the traffic that would be generated by increased development along new Westbard Avenue and the impact it would have on their block. Consequently, the residents of old Westbard Avenue were heavily involved in the discussions about redevelopment. Protecting them from increased traffic was one of my major concerns as discussions over the Westbard Sector Plan ensued.

Westbard Realignment - Protecting Springfield

Early on in the discussions, Montgomery County planners recommended realignment of new Westbard Avenue so it would flow directly into River Road with an improved design at the previous intersection of River Road and Ridgefield Road. While this was suggested as a benefit to the developer, who wanted a "gateway" into the redeveloped Westwood shopping/residential area, many members of the Springfield board and community, myself included, saw this as a benefit to the overall Springfield community:

- 1) It would provide a distinct "border" between the new Westbard area and the Springfield community.
- 2) It would eliminate the Ridgefield Road/Westbard Avenue intersection as a potential chokepoint for traffic trying to get to the new Westbard redevelopment from River Road.
- 3) It would eliminate Ridgefield Road -- a local, Springfield community road lined with single-family home residences, which extends about a mile into the Springfield community -- from being part of the network of roads regularly used by members of the broader community.
- 4) The intersection of new Westbard Avenue and River Road (previously River Road/Ridgefield Road) could be redesigned so tractor-trailers, trucks, school buses and other large vehicles could easily make the turn from eastbound River Road to new Westbard Ave., perhaps preventing some —but not all —from turning onto old Westbard Avenue.

But the realignment of new Westbard Avenue and the closure of old Westbard Avenue at River Road were not solidified until the sector plan was under final review by the Council. It had taken nearly two

years of negotiating with planners, developers, Planning Board and Council members and their staffs, before it was written into the 2016 Westbard Sector Plan.

Objections to the Closure

I know there are some residents in the Springfield community who would like to have old Westbard Avenue at River Road reopened while further study of traffic on many community roads including Springfield Drive, Ogden Road and Ridgefield Road, is done. This will only forestall the closure of old Westbard Avenue at River Road and result in more sleepless nights for the homeowners along the 5500 Westbard Avenue block.

Many of the residents supporting the re-opening of old Westbard Avenue at River Road live on streets in Springfield that were/are significantly impacted by cut-through traffic, including tractor-trailers, since the construction of the realignment of new Westbard Avenue began. For the last year and a quarter, these residents were/are suddenly experiencing the type of cut-through traffic old Westbard Avenue has been experiencing for at least a decade previously and they are unhappy about that. They fear that if old Westbard Avenue at River Road continues to be closed, they will continue to get the cut-through traffic the Springfield community never had prior to the new Westbard realignment and redevelopment.

However, much of the cut-through traffic going through the Springfield community is a result of drivers not wanting to use the detour from the Westwood shopping center that has them traveling to Goldsboro Road. Instead, many of these drivers cut through the Springfield community, turning left onto River Road at Springfield Drive or Ogden Road. I am confident that much of this traffic will resume using new Westbard Avenue when it is opened from Massachusetts Avenue to River Road.

Will a certain percentage of drivers continue to cut through Springfield streets? Probably. Increased cut-through traffic may be inevitable given the increased development planned along new Westbard Avenue — a 200-unit multi-family building; 70+ townhouses; a 115-unit senior living facility and another 30+ townhouses at the corner of Westbard Avenue and River Road with an entrance on old Westbard Avenue. This is a reality our community will have to live with as more housing comes to our area. But if MCDOT reopens the intersection at old Westbard Avenue and River Road, the brunt of this cut-through traffic will end up on this one block, contrary to the compromises made when accepting the increased density under the 2016 Westbard Sector Plan.

Increased Car & Truck Traffic

Residents of old Westbard Avenue will not just have to deal with an explosive increase in the number of cars that go through this block, but also in the number of trucks. As MCDOT traffic studies have shown, from 2017 to 2020, the number of trucks that used old Westbard Avenue increased significantly. In 2017, the total number of trucks traveling along both north and southbound old Westbard Avenue per week was 135. By 2020, this number had risen to 331 – nearly 2.5 times as many as three years prior. This is despite signs limiting the G.V.W. of trucks, speed humps, no right turn signs during morning rush hour from eastbound River Road and a concrete island that directs (or attempts to direct) traffic to turn right only from northbound old Westbard Avenue.

Even while new Westbard Avenue is under construction and the signs by River Road and old Westbard Avenue clearly say the street is only opened to local traffic, tractor-trailer drivers are still ignoring them and rumbling down this block only to find they can't turn around unless they damage county and private property (a practice that has been documented by residents).

If old Westbard Avenue is closed at the intersection with River Road, most of the people who will be affected by this closure will be people living outside our community who use that block as a "short-cut" from River Road to cut through to the shopping center or Massachusetts Avenue. We want these people to use the new Westbard Avenue intersection. Within our community, residents mainly use Ridgefield Road to get to Westbard Avenue and they will probably continue to use it as many of our streets actually border on or flow into this road.

As said earlier, one of the main reasons for realigning new Westbard Avenue was to ensure that all trucks and school buses could safely negotiate the turn from eastbound River Road to new Westbard Avenue without turning into oncoming lanes of traffic. Hopefully, the realignment has solved that problem. But the realignment cannot 100 percent guarantee that trucks will follow that route unless old Westbard Avenue at River Road is closed. Given the continued construction expected along new Westbard Avenue through 2026, followed by an increase in the residential and retail space available, the likelihood of construction vehicles, delivery trucks and tractor-trailers still using old Westbard Avenue, will increase exponentially. This 5500 Westbard Avenue block is a single-family home residential street; it was never intended to be a truck bypass.

Compliance with Vision Zero

When homes on this street were first built in the late 1950's, early 1960's, the street was closed to traffic at River Road, according to one long-time resident. When it was opened in 1962, when River Road was widened from two to four lanes from the Beltway to the D.C. border, no one anticipated GPS and other way-finding apps, nor the increased development in Westbard, Friendship Heights, downtown Bethesda and northwest D.C. and the resulting burgeoning population in Montgomery County, that has exposed this residential block to such increased traffic.

Some of the 24 families who live on old Westbard Avenue have lived there for decades. Others have moved in more recently. With nearly a dozen children living on the block, concern must be shown for their safety and their ability to safely get to school bus stops and to walk to the homes of their friends who live on their street and other streets in our community. If MCDOT wants to ensure the county's Vision Zero policy for this block, it will only be possible if old Westbard Avenue is closed now to all but emergency vehicles at the intersection with River Road.

I oppose the requested closure of Westbard Ave at River Road by a small group of residents acting on their own behalf and not at the service of the greater public who pays for the public roads.

At the very least, this is a highly premature request – especially because the Springfield neighborhood of 600+ homes (which is most directly affected by this closure request) has no idea at this time how the additional shopping center traffic will affect the general area.

Based on what I have seen of the construction of the "new Westbard Avenue/entryway to the shopping center," the traffic lanes seem narrow, and will no doubt back-up quickly given the volume of traffic in the area. Frankly, we need MORE options for getting in and out of the neighborhood; and more options for getting to and from the shopping center – not fewer.

Further, public streets, by their very nature, are not meant to be private driveways for the exclusive service of a small cadre of residents who don't like traffic. In any event, there are residents on that particular street who WANTED the Westbard development and who explicitly wrote letters in support of the development. They will get what they bargained for – increased traffic due to a large new development.

Please also recall that Leland Street in downtown Bethesda attempted to close their downtown Bethesda street in approximately 2017. The outcome: The residents on that street were ultimately told that "their" public street would not be closed to the public; but this decision was only reached AFTER the public uproar over the actual closure of Leland Street. In fact, after approximately two weeks, the decision to close Leland Street was reversed, and the street is currently subject to reasonable turning restrictions (based on the time of day). The Leland Street debacle should inform your decision regarding the requested Westbard Avenue closure. Therefore, rather than closing the public street, please institute reasonable turning restrictions on this public street.

Finally, you may recall that the Kenwood neighborhood (in the Westbard area) wanted to close access to its neighborhood public streets many years ago. Kenwood was also told NO, and they were given time-of-day turning restrictions from River Road into the their neighborhood as the compromise position (another precedent for your guidance).

I oppose this closure.

As a resident of Ridgefield Road, I strongly object to the proposal to close Westbard Avenue at River Road. If Westbard Avenue at River Road were to remain closed once Ridgefield Road is reopened, Ridgefield Road and the adjacent cross-streets will see a significant increase in cut-through traffic, just as it did prior to the temporary closure of Ridgefield at Westbard.

The reasons Westbard residents are seeking relief from cut-through traffic are equally (if not more) applicable to residents on and near Ridgefield Road. Yet by requesting permanent closure of Westbard at River, Westbard residents are seeking to unfairly place ALL of the traffic burden on residents on and near Ridgefield Road, Springfield Drive, Cromwell Drive and Ogden Road, as well as Newington and Albia Roads.

Public safety considerations alone should dissuade MDOT from closing Westbard. Over 40 school aged children live along Ridgefield Road between Springfield and Westbard, and countless more walk daily to bus stops on Ridgefield Road. Ridgefield and its nearby cross-streets have three bus stops (none are on Westbard between Ridgefield and River) and closure would again place numerous school children in the middle of this unsafe traffic pattern. Elementary school children walk to Woodacres Elementary School along Ridgefield Road and its cross streets as well as along Springfield Drive and Cromwell Drive. Pedestrian and bicycle

Ridgefield Road is <u>not wide enough</u> to handle such traffic as <u>it is barely 27 feet wide</u> and contains several curves and hills – whereas Westbard is a <u>four-lane 45 feet wide</u> straight "AVENUE." It is by far the widest street in the Springfield neighborhood. Yet the closure of Westbard at River Road will keep traffic off of this significantly safer Avenue and force traffic onto narrower winding roads where pedestrians will be at significant risk.

In addition, there are hundreds of townhomes and apartments to be built in the coming years in the Westbard construction. The residents of these homes will require street access to River Road, and, if there is traffic going into and out of the Westbard Square shopping area, they will face significant delays when trying to reach a main thoroughfare -- River Road -- if there is no access off of the existing Westbard Avenue.

In order to ensure that ALL residents of Springfield on roads that will be affected by cut-through traffic heading to and from Westbard Square are as safe as possible, I request that:

- 1. WESTBARD AVENUE REMAIN PERMANENTLY OPEN AT RIVER ROAD, OR

It is important to note that this block of Westbard Avenue is within the defined boundaries of the SCA and many of its residents are dues paying members of the SCA. As of today, this block of Westbard Avenue is still part of the Springfield Civic Association.

The SCA very much appreciates the perspective of residents of the 5500 block of Westbard Avenue and respects the rights of any particular block or street to organize, but the Planning Board must be aware that no other Civic Association speaks for the Springfield neighborhood.

On the subject of closing Westbard Avenue, the Westbard Sector Plan provided that "action on this closure is predicated on the submittal of a formal neighborhood application for street closure..." To the extent that a formal application was made, it was certainly not made with the SCA's knowledge or involvement. For context, the Springfield neighborhood contains approximately 650 households. The 5500 block of Westbard Avenue contains approximately 25.

This proposal has major implications for many other individuals besides the residents of the 5500 block of Westbard Avenue. Over the past year, as construction of the new road proceeded, Springfield neighborhood roads which are narrow and unsuited to handle high volumes of traffic, witnessed exponential increases in traffic volume with very serious safety consequences. A closure of the 5500 block of Westbard Avenue will also affect other residents of Westbard Avenue and the Wood Acres neighborhood as well. These consequences must be studied.

We also want to note that, according to the Sector Plan, closure should not occur until the existing Westbard Road/River Road intersection is realigned. Currently, the road is not realigned. Later this fall, the realigned road will only partially reopen. The new Westbard road will still remain cut-off from the Springfield neighborhood. That connection will not be restored until early 2024 when Ridgefield Road is reopened. Any traffic studies that are conducted prior to this reopening will not capture the true implications of a permanent closure of the 5500 block of Westbard Avenue.

We are very glad that the Planning Board will be holding a public hearing on this issue, which will allow all neighborhood residents and affected individuals to testify on this issue. However, we believe consideration of closing this road is premature and unwarranted at this time. We would encourage the Board to delay the public hearing and any studies that may need to be conducted until after the new Westbard Avenue has fully reopened so that ALL neighborhood residents, the MCDoT, the police and the Planning Board will have a better sense of how the new traffic patterns are operating and can provide more informed testimony to the Planning Board.

Dear Ms. McCray,

My family has been living in our home at since 1976. In the 47 years we have seen the quality of life and the condition of the street deteriorate due to the heavy volume of traffic, primarily from illegal cut-through commuter traffic in the mornings and evenings. I remember when we first moved into our house and we could safely play in our yards, visit our neighbors and enter/exit our driveways without the risk of getting hit by a truck or car speeding down our street.

In the mornings, daily commuters come down River Rd into DC and illegally use Westbard Avenue as a cut through to Mass Ave. This flow of illegal turns occurs despite a sign on River Rd prohibiting right turns onto Westbard during the morning rush-hour. We occasionally have police at the intersection to stop cars that have made the illegal turn from River Rd. You can probably review the records on the occasions that the police are there and how many tickets they give out during the morning commute hours. We understand that having police sitting on our street daily to enforce the traffic pattern is not realistic and we would all be better served if they spent their time elsewhere. Even with the occasional police presence and the signage it has not deterred the commuters. I have seen commuters when the road was first closed off to traffic move the temporary barriers to make the turn onto Westbard or the left turn onto River Rd from Westbard.

During the evening these same commuters take a right turn onto Westbard Ave from Mass Ave and then ignore the sign at the intersection of Westbard Ave and River Rd prohibiting a very dangerous left turn onto River Rd. This poses a significant risk to the traffic in both directions on River Rd. which is why the left-hand turn from Westbard Ave to River Rd was deemed illegal. Without closing the intersection completely, we will still have commuters make the illegal turns.

Development of the Westbard shopping center is going to include construction of hundreds of new residential units with several hundred or more new residents. The final development will include apartments, townhomes, and an assisted living facility. The newly realigned Westbard was specifically designed to handle the significant increase of traffic volume heading to/from River Road that will come from the new development. There is no good reason to keep the original Westbard and River intersection open as it would not serve a purpose with the new realigned Westbard.

We fully expect that even with the realigned Westbard Ave, at the end of the construction that there will still be countless commuters who would rather use the original Westbard cut thru to avoid a traffic light on their way to Mass Ave. if it is available.

We appreciate the efforts that the community and local government have implemented in the past to address the traffic issues and the dangerous conditions, but they are not enough. We have an opportunity to better the quality of life, safety for our family and our neighbors by voting to close the original Westbard Avenue at the intersection with River Rd.

We hope the decision makers will vote yes in support of our AB-786 (Permanent Closure of the intersection of River Road and Westbard Avenue) petition, confirming that the safety of the residents of the 5500 Westbard Ave block is compelling enough to close the "old" dangerous Westbard Ave & River Rd intersection. Closing the intersection will eliminate dangerous truck and car cut-through traffic driving through our block while only adding ~20 seconds for the commuters to use the "new" and better designed Westbard Ave & River Rd intersection with stoplights and permanent turn lanes.



We are writing to express our strong support for the proposed permanent closure of the old Westbard Avenue-River Road intersection.

Our petition/support for the closure is not solely based on our self-interests, of course from an individual's point of view, everyone everywhere wants to restrict the access to their street; no denial this closure will benefit us - residents on this street. However this petition is mainly and critically based on a strived neutral stand, we look at the benefits/costs of the two options' impacts, not just on us but also on our neighboring communities, the public transportation and public safety. Our review leads us to conclude that overall, the benefits of the closure outweighs the costs. It not only benefits us but will also be a very positive contributor to the public interest. This is based on the following essential facts and logic.

The key fact is that there is a defined volume of traffic to reach one destination, it starts from one road, then has two options into two roads for a very short distance (those two short distances of roads have no practical values to anyone but those who live on that short street - our part of the old Westbard), then those two roads have to join again into one road to reach the only destination. Mathematically, is it more efficient to Maximize the traffic on a main artery and minimize the traffic on a secondary road (efficiency comes from the less frequent stops)? Or is it more efficient to let the

traffic equally or randomly split into two roads and then meet again to merge into one to reach the destination - then results in a lot of stops at the meeting point in this case. Anyone with common sense can figure that out - max the main artery road's traffic flow if the traffic on the secondary roads don't mind waiting longer. Our planners seem to have fully understood that applied it into their planning, it appears that is the major purpose/benefits of realigning the River to New Westbard directly and get rid of the old intersection, and minimize the cutting traffic from our street through less stops.

Here is our situation. The new Westbard Avenue and realignment of Ridgefield is designed for the direct traffic flow from River into the new Westbard avenue into the Shopping Center, eliminating the intersection at the Ridgefield and Old Westbard. People coming from our street end of the River, before or after the alignment, without choice, have to meet the traffic that is coming directly from the River. Because cutting through our street to reach the shopping center or from the River directly to the newly aligned Westbard have almost the same distance, there is no time wasted or inconveniences for the people who used to cut through our street to reach the shopping center. Furthermore, without the cutting traffic from our street, the traffic directly turning into the newly aligned Westbard will flow much more smoothly with less frequent stops required due to traffic from our street. Conclusion, positive contribution to facilitate the flow of traffic directly from the River into the realigned Westbard due to less frequent stops; no negative impact on the public transportation or inconvenience to the travelers.

Another benefit to the public is traffic safety. First of all, travelers cutting into our street from the River side is often a safety hazard to our street residents, often children - as we have witnessed so often the high speed of entering traffic from the River, despite speed pumps. More importantly, the exit traffic from our street into the River is a very very dangerous thing, accidents waiting to happen. Traffic entering our street from the Shopping center side has only one purpose and possibility - to turn left into River (it is useless to turn right into River because there is nothing between those two points of River. Those traffic always try to cut into left - a westward high speed traffic flow. It slows the traffic and also becomes a danger to themselves and others. They could more efficiently and safely go on to the River through the newly aligned Westbard, instead of cutting through our street.

Based on these facts, we can conclude that any rational person will be better off using the newly aligned Westbard and River, instead of cutting through our small segment of the old Westbard to reach the shopping center or exit to River.

There are inconveniences: the Closure will cause some inconveniences for us who live on the street or Ridgefield - we have to wait much longer than before for the traffic light to get into the newly aligned Westbard to go to the Shopping center or to River (because the green traffic light must have much longer period to the major artery of newly aligned Westbard than our secondary streets - deducted from the size of the new Westbard-River. However, that inconvenience will be more than compensated by the safety we will gain through the Closure, therefore gladly accepted.

Why people who live on Ridgefield or in Springfield will oppose the Closure is puzzling. Drivers getting on Ridgefield want to go to the Shopping Center or to the River or to Mass. This cohort of drivers won't need to come to the side of the River into our street if they make rational calculations in terms of time and convenience. Divers used to cut our street won't go to cut through the Springfield because that is much more cumbersome than going through the newly aligned Westbard. It is difficult to imagine the basis/facts of their opposition. It might be the general presumption that one street's closure in a neighborhood is equal to the dumping of more traffic on the other streets, therefore might negatively impact them? It might be true in some cases, but not this one. One needs to look at the facts and the benefits/costs of each route's option to arrive at a conclusion.

If the Closure of our street to River road has a positive impact on traffic flow, transportation safety, our street residents' safety and quality of life - we can clearly deduct that are the purpose and calculation from the planners' design - why can't it be done?

Therefore this petition/support for the Closure is not solely a self-interest endeavor, it is also beneficial to public safety and transportation efficiency without identified sufferers.

Please take a fact based approach to do review/analysis on the opposition/ support, approve this Closure and fulfill the promise made by the county in the Master Plan.

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

Tiara:

I'd like to submit a few final documents for the public record, along with these explanatory notes:

- 1) The full county council staff report which originally recommended including the compromise language in the 2016 Westbard Sector Plan, and which explained why the permanent street closure had to wait until the road realignment completion. I'd recommend tagging it to note that pages 8 and 9 are the only relevant pages, given that it's a very long document.
- 2) The attached image "345 foot cul-de-sac.PNG". A fire accessible cul-de-sac requires a 110' diameter circle within the public right of way. 90' of pavement from curb-to-curb, plus 10' along the outer perimeter. I used MCatlas to demonstrate that the existing public right of way can accommodate this. MCatlas doesn't allow for diameter displays, but it does allow circumference displays, and a circle with a diameter of 110' has a circumference of 345'.
- 3) The attached image "Westbard Hammerhead Turnaround.PNG". A 140' \times 20' hammerhead turnaround is fire accessible, per Dr Marie LaBaw. This image shows a hammerhead of those dimensions fitting in the right-of-way. MCatlas can only display the total perimeter. 140 + 140 + 20 + 20 = 320.

I'm sure you're getting bombarded with last-minute additions to the public record, and I'm sorry to keep adding to the queue.




There is nothing significant about the number of accidents at this intersection, nor their severity. In addition to keeping track of the number of accidents, Montgomery County keeps track of severity. While several other intersections in our community have witnessed Severe or even Fatal accidents, including River Rd. and Springfield Dr., River Rd. and Ogden Rd., and Massachusetts Ave. and Osceola Rd. None of the accidents at Westbard Avenue and River Road were considered severe.

Claim 2: Westbard Avenue Experiences extreme cut-through traffic.


Reality: Traffic volumes on the 5500 Block of Westbard Avenue <u>are a fraction</u> of the volumes experienced in the rest of the Springfield Neighborhood.

- In a traffic study conducted by Montgomery County DOT in 2020, traffic weekday volume on the 5500 Block of Westbard Avenue averaged less than 1,600 cars per day.
- In 2022, after the road closure, traffic counts from Mongtomery County Police Department revealed the following volumes:
 - Ridgefield Road: est. 4,500 cars per day
 - Cromwell Road: est. 3,400 cars per day









- Mitigation Efforts
 - Signalized crosswalks
 - A narrow entrance at Brookside Drive and Westbard Avenue.

Per Article 49, To be closed, a road cannot be needed for current or future access.

A traffic study and real time evidence is needed to support this claim

- In the 2016 Sector Plan, the road was to be realigned with the purpose of Protecting Single Family Neighborhoods.
- We hope this will be the outcome, but a study needs to reveal if this is the case.
- Other tools are available, like restricted turns and closing a median are preferred.
- This was the conclusion of the Planning Department Staff's report.



Claim 5: There is a 5500 Westbard Avenue Block Civic Association

Reality

This is not a formal civic association.

There are 24 homes on Westbard Avenue who petitioned to have their street closed permanently with no emergency vehicle access.

It is unknown why these residents called themselves a "Civic Association," but one can presume it was to make their request sound like it was what the Springfield Neighborhood wanted.

This request does not benefit the rest of the neighborhood, but it does potentially harm it.

More than 80 residents of Springfield who are negatively impacted by the current road closures signed a petition against this permanent closure at this point in time without further study. This was not led by the Springfield Civic Association. These are not "random" residents, but homes who believe they are and will be directly impacted by the closure.

Conclusion

No number of accidents is tolerable. Every accident is horrible.

No amount of Cut Through Traffic is acceptable.

HOWEVER:

- The SCA cannot support the permanent closure of <u>any</u> road, when current conditions are this bad, unless it is known that it will not negatively impact the safety of other roads in our neighborhood.
- We believe prior statements have been exaggerated to support self serving interests.
- There are 650 homes in the Springfield Neighborhood. We are thinking about all of them.

Please add this communication, and the attachment, to the public record.

Last night, the Maryland State Highway Administration made a public presentation on their progress thus far in their safety study on the River Road corridor, extending from Springfield Drive to Little Falls Parkway.

As part of their presentation, they included the attached slide. It is a visual illustration of vehicular crash density along River Road. It includes heat mapping of crashes, with the areas of densest crashes being shown in yellow.

The SHA's heat map shows that the intersection of Westbard Avenue and River Road is one of the 3 most dangerous points in the entire study area. An enormous amount of crashes happen at this intersection. This aligns with the incident numbers of car crashes which we included as "Exhibit D" to our original petition application letter.

This is an unsignalized intersection between a secondary neighborhood road and a state highway. There is absolutely no reason for these car crashes to continue happening now that a brand new signalized intersection is nearing completion. All future traffic should be channeled through the newly realigned road's signalized intersection.

Please approve the petition to close down this dangerous, unsignalized, unnecessary intersection.

should remain unchanged.) The proposed plan also calls for 10'-wide shared-use trails on each side of this segment of Westbard Avenue. Ms. Lynne Battle testified against widening the west-side sidewalk to a 10'-wide trail, decrying the encroachment on woods that abut Westland MS.

Council staff recommends no change to the existing cross-section or right-of-way on Westbard Avenue south of the intersection with the proposed B-2, except that the 5'-wide sidewalk on the east side be widened to a 10'-wide shared-use trail. Where a higher-level bikeway is warranted, road cross-sections typically either have: (1) a one-way cycle track in each direction flanked by sidewalks; (2) a two-way cycle track on one side and sidewalks on both sides; or (3) a shared-use trail on one side and a sidewalk on the other (this being the most common configuration outside commercial areas). Council staff sees no special circumstance here that warrants shared-use trails on both sides of Westbard Avenue.

For the portion of Westbard Avenue north of B-2 the Draft Plan shows two optional cross-sections. Both would feature four through lanes (with the outside lanes used for parking in the off-peak) flanked by one-way cycle tracks and sidewalks. Option B would also include a narrow median. Option A has a minimum 100' right-of-way, while Option B has a minimum 110' right-of-way. Council staff recommends Option B, to provide more flexibility to design in all of the street elements. Furthermore, the diagram on page 30 should show each lane to be 11'-wide—10' for driving plus 1' for the gutter and shy area from the curbs—and the text on page 29 should note that there would be a median.

Westbard Avenue realignment. Westbard Avenue is proposed to be relocated so that it ties in directly to River Road. This is desirable for at least two reasons: it would provide continuous flow between River Road and Westbard's core without having to negotiate left- or right-turns at the current intersection with Ridgefield Road; and the junction with River Road would become a proper right-angled intersection, much more able to accommodate right-turning vehicles from inbound River Road to Westbard Avenue. Council staff recommends clarifying the text on page 29 by amending it to read:

Westbard Avenue, a business district street, heading toward River Road, should be reconfigured to [be reconfigured to prioritize the traffic movement from Westbard Avenue to Ridgefield Road] tie directly to River Road with a right-angled intersection, instead of teeing into Ridgefield Road [to River Road].

The description of this improvement in the table of future capital improvements (Table 4.1.1 on p. 93) similarly should be amended (but with fewer words).

Westbard "Court." Drs. Cynthia Green and Xinsheng Zeng, residents of Westbard Avenue's 1000'-long block between River and Ridgefield Roads, testified about the substantial and long-standing cut-through traffic that has been occurring on their block. Unlike the rest of Westbard Avenue, this block is a Secondary Residential Street and is fronted by 21 single-family homes and three townhouses. Right-turns from inbound River Road are prohibited from 7-9 am, and heavy trucks are prohibited at all times. However, many ignore these prohibitions. It is a natural cut-through route: it is a shorter distance to the core of Westbard, and it avoids the intersection of River and Ridgefield Roads, which is signalized and requires an acute right turn that many larger vehicles cannot negotiate without encroaching on the approach lane. A primary reason for the realignment noted above is to allow this turn to occur smoothly.

The Springfield Civic Association and the residents of this block have written requesting that Westbard Avenue be permanently closed at the River Road end (©34-37). Some master plans have included recommendations for certain streets to be permanently closed, although there is a process (similar to the street abandonment process) that must be followed before a street can be legally closed. Including this as a master plan recommendation would buttress the argument once the street closure is formally requested. Council staff recommends that the Plan call for the permanent closure of Westbard Avenue at its River Road end. If the Council agrees, the following points should either be included either in the text or the legislative history:

- The closure should not occur until Westbard Avenue is realigned to intersect River Road with a right-angled turn. Some vehicles need street space to access the Westbard core; until the River/Ridgefield intersection is realigned, the vehicles may still need to use the residential block of Westbard Avenue. Hopefully the realignment will occur early in the redevelopment of Westbard. At that time this residential block should be re-named to avoid confusion with realigned Westbard Avenue. "Westbard Court," perhaps?
- The closed end should have a mountable curb to allow emergency vehicles to access the block directly from River Road.
- The closed end should be reconstructed to create a turnaround. Trash trucks, snow plows, and other large vehicles serving the homes need means to return without backing up this long block.

Kenwood. Kenwood is concerned about existing and potentially greater cut-through traffic, particularly on Dorset Avenue and Brookside Drive. At present, through traffic from Ridgefield Road (what in the future would be realigned Westbard Avenue) to Brookside Drive is prohibited during peak periods, although Kenwood residents report that some traffic still passes through in that direction then. The Kenwood Committee for Westbard/River Road has written about the land use proposed near this intersection (which will be taken up at a subsequent worksession) and has suggests more study of the intersection itself (©38-39).

One suggestion from the Kenwood Committee is to consider physically channeling the left- and right-turning lanes from the realigned Westbard Avenue onto River Road, effectively precluding the through movement to Brookside Drive at all times. Cut-through traffic also could be reduced if the reverse through movement—from Brookside Drive to realigned Westbard Avenue—were also prohibited, at least during peak hours. However, any such prohibition would also hinder Kenwood residents wishing to drive to and from the Westbard core, as well as to Westland MS and Little Falls Library. Council staff recommends that the Plan encourages the Department of Transportation and the State Highway Administration to work with Kenwood to develop a design and operations at this intersection that better protects Kenwood from cut-through traffic without restricting safe and convenient access between realigned Westbard Avenue and River Road.

Other nearby neighborhoods. Other neighborhoods have raised concerns about existing or potential cut-through traffic, but none are as obvious as "Westbard Court" and Kenwood. The County has a cut-through traffic regulation which allows for a traffic control scheme that could restrict turns and, in the extreme, close roads if a sufficient through-traffic problem materializes and the affected neighborhoods accept it. The regulation is here:

Ms. MCCray,

While the 5500 Westbard residents are well organized in their efforts to close their street, many of their neighbors are unaware of these efforts and their potential impact.

What we do know:

A. Since construction on the Westbard Complex began, ALL neighboring streets have experienced a marked (and sometimes unexpected) increase in traffic. Ridgefield, Springfield, Ogden, Newington, and Albia, have seen the bulk of the increase. (5500 Westbard, being closed, was not impacted.)

- B. All residents of all of these streets would be happy to have less traffic on their streets.
- B.One selling point of the new entrance from River Road onto Ridgefield was that it would mitigate traffic on the 5500 block of Westbard Ave.
- C. The Westbard 5500 group submitted their petition to the county without notifying the neighborhood association, thus preempting any open discussion of the issue.
- D. Westbard Avenue is a public street. Its closure should not happen without a study of the impact of the increased density to come and its resultant traffic. .

What we don't know:

- 1. The overall traffic impact on the neighborhood that will occur after all the of the final construction (30 townhomes, an eldercare facility, and a 300 unit apartment complex) is complete.
- 2. Whether the new entrance will in fact absorb the increased traffic that will result from the significant population increase.

It is likely that, even with the construction of the new connection between River and Ridgefield Roads, traffic will be heavier on all of the neighboring streets (as mentioned above). The responsible solution to this question would be to follow the recommendations of the Springfield Civic Association and delay any street closure decisions until the Westbard construction is complete and a study can evaluate the extent of traffic impact.

As a member of the Springfield Civic Association and the erstwhile chair of its Traffic Committee, I oppose the petition to permanently close Westbard Ave @ River Rd. This is the **Only Equitable** answer to this matter since this petition is without merit and standing. The reasons are as follows:

- 1. The closure of the 5500 block of Westbard Avenue could create spillover traffic on other neighborhood streets in the Springfield Neighborhood and that additional study — ideally following completion of Westbard Square — is the only responsible way to evaluate this possibility. The Westbard Avenue reconstruction that also closed Westbard Avenue at River Rd caused massive. unanticipated traffic effects on neighboring streets. MCPD conducted traffic counts showed 5,400 vehicles per day diverted to Ridgefield Rd and 3500 cars/day diverted to Springfield Drive, Cromwell Drive and Ogden Road. Ridgefield Rd is the narrowest street in the neighborhood, with 3 MCPS bus stops and is the main route for pedestrians, bicyclists and children walking to Westbard Square, the Capital Crescent Trail and neighborhood schools. It is a narrow, hilly road part of it without sidewalks and winds its way through the entire neighborhood - any traffic issue on this road has a very high community impact. There have been many near misses - involving schoolchildrenand several accidents on this street in the last 18 months. Westbard Ave, on the other hand, is the widest street in the neighborhood with double yellow lines, sidewalks on both sides, and with only 20 homes has the least community impact. Traffic counts on Westbard Avenue conducted in 2020 showed an average daily volume of 689 vehicles / day which is one-tenth of the traffic counts on other neighborhood streets. Closing Westbard Ave to the detriment of 650 homes in the Springfield neighborhood is NOT EQUITABLE.
- 2. The closure petition is inconsistent with the Westbard Sector Plan.
- a)The Westbard Sector Plan recommended that a closure petition be submitted by a *neighborhood civic association.* The Springfield Civic Association was neither informed or consulted before the closure petition was submitted, and had no input on its contents. The 5500 Westbard Block Association represents one block of ~20 homes, not the 650 home Springfield neighborhood. Westbard Ave residents are members of the Springfield Civic Association and last year even campaigned for positions on its board. There is NO Neighborhood Petition submitted to request for this closure.
- b)The Westbard Sector Plan recommended that the 5500 block of Westbard Avenue remain accessible to emergency vehicles via a 3-inch mountable curb. The closure petition would block emergency vehicle access by erecting a substantial permanent barrier.
- c) The Westbard Sector Plan stated that a formal neighborhood petition be submitted after the road construction was complete the road construction is not complete and neither is the massive development project.

3. The applicant, Benjamin Mann of Westbard Ave, has threatened the Springfield Civic Association. The applicant purports "to have a friendly relationship with MCDOT given their commercial real estate background and is very confident that their application will be accepted because of this said relationship. They also state that if the SCA opposes their application they will be organizing opposition to traffic calming measures in the Springfield neighborhood for years to come and the removal of existing safety measures once the detour ends"

We hope the MCDOT will make this decision based on objective facts and data and will not be swayed by this rhetoric or any closeness of relationship between the applicant and MCDOT.

4. Westbard Ave residents have been going door to door in the Springfield neighborhood and misrepresenting facts to try to garner support for their application. They have made 2 assertions - 1) The closure of the 5500 block of Westbard Ave will not have any impact on the traffic situation in the rest of the neighborhood. If this were indeed the case, they would not have an issue with a traffic study to verify that fact. 2) That MCDOT will implement traffic safety measures in the rest of the neighborhood so as to mitigate any traffic impacts. Since MCDOT has been very clear that no changes will be made - this is a clear misrepresentation.

Closing this road will *also* lead to an inundation of random civic associations petitioning self-serving measures. For example, what's to stop the creation of a "Springfield Drive Civic Association" from petitioning closure of Springfield Road between Cromwell and River Roads? What's to stop "Ridgefield Road Civic Association" from unanimously petitioning for permanent closure of the Ridgefield at Westbard? When will it end?

Please block the permanent closure of Westbard Avenue & River Road intersection.

My family and I reside at a subject of the petitioned closure. We are among the residents that will be most directly impacted by this petitioned closure. We support the request for closure of the Westbard/River intersection, for all the reasons already described in the record.

Additionally, we offer the following points be taken into consideration:

- The closure of this Westbard/River intersection was one element among many others that were integrated into the larger approved 2016 Westbard Sector Plan. This Plan had already been afforded much administrative due process including opportunity for public comment, whether supporting or opposing. The submission of this petition for review was specifically described in the Plan in order to enact the closure. Accordingly, this petition should be treated as nothing more than a ministerial procedure to officially effectuate the closure, and not as an attempt to reopen the record to weigh comments in opposition to the closure.
- However, if you must give weight to the substantive comments in opposition to the closure, much of the
 opposition cites the inordinate increase in cut through traffic through the broad Springfield
 neighborhood when the Westbard realignment construction began. This increased traffic was foreseen,
 and is only expected to last for the duration of the street closures. Once the realigned Westbard street
 reopens, cut through traffic into the Springfield neighborhood streets should dissipate.
- The claim that closing the intersection of Westbard and River will cause cut through traffic to spill into the broader Springfield neighborhood is incorrect. The type of dangerous cut-through traffic that would use this Westbard/River intersection is primarily traffic intending to shortcut the travel between River Road or the remainder of Westbard Avenue, and NOT traffic that would otherwise traverse through the broader Springfield neighborhood to the north.
- Those that oppose this closure have called for additional studies to be performed. However, performing additional studies will only be a further waste of time, resources, and taxpayer dollars. Studies have already been done, ample data exists supporting closure of this Westbard/River intersection.
- Closure of the intersection of Westbard and River will enhance the safety of pedestrian and bicycle
 traffic. The newly realigned Westbard Avenue will have significantly widened pedestrian walkways and
 bike paths, distinctly separated from vehicular traffic. Closure will incentivize vehicular traffic to stay on

Due to the road closures of Westbard Ave at River Road and River Road last year, the Springfield neighborhood - especially Ridgefield Road, Springfield Drive, Cromwell Road and Ogden Road - had been inundated with a constant stream of trucks and a large volume of commuter vehicles trying to access the open part of Westbard Avenue to either get to the Westbard Square or Massachusetts Ave. The detour plan directing commuters/trucks to use Goldsboro or Little Falls Parkway or to Massachusetts to Westbard Avenue had in effect failed to divert the traffic away from the neighborhood, and county police have confirmed their inability to enforce the detour plan. Ridgefield Road, a narrow and hilly residential street, without permit parking required to park on either side of the street, was bearing the brunt of the cut through traffic, making it difficult to leave homes and creating unsafe conditions for pedestrians and children.

On the contrary, Westbard Avenue is a flat, 45 feet wide road, with permit parking on both sides and numerous speed bumps. It has clear line demarcations separating sides of the road, and is undeniably better equipped to handle this volume of traffic without putting pedestrians, children, or vehicles in harms way.

Westbard Ave at River Road should be permanently reopened at the very least so that Ridgefield, Springfield, Cromwell, Ogden and Westbard are *equally* sharing the volume of traffic during the road realignment.

By requesting permanent closure of Westbard at River, Westbard residents are seeking to unfairly place *all* of the traffic burden on residents on and near Ridgefield Road, Springfield Drive, Cromwell Drive, and Ogden Road.

Public safety measures alone should dissuade MDOT from closing Westbard at River. Over 40 school aged children live along Ridgefield Road between Springfield and Westbard. Ridgefield and neighboring streets have three bus stops (Westbard has none) and placing numerous children in the middle of unsafe traffic patterns (evidenced last year) is unfounded. Last night, the Maryland State Highway Administration made a public presentation on their progress thus far in their safety study on the River Road corridor, extending from Springfield Drive to Little Falls Parkway.


As part of their presentation, they included the attached slide. It is a visual illustration of vehicular crash density along River Road. It includes heat mapping of crashes, with the areas of densest crashes being shown in yellow.

The SHA's heat map shows that the intersection of Westbard Avenue and River Road is one of the 3 most dangerous points in the entire study area. An enormous amount of crashes happen at this intersection. This aligns with the incident numbers of car crashes which we included as "Exhibit D" to our original petition application letter.

This is an unsignalized intersection between a secondary neighborhood road and a state highway. There is absolutely no reason for these car crashes to continue happening now that a brand new signalized intersection is nearing completion. All future traffic should be channeled through the newly realigned road's signalized intersection.

Please approve the petition to close down this dangerous, unsignalized, unnecessary intersection.

I write today in my personal capacity as a decades-long resident of Ridgefield Road in the Springfield neighborhood of Bethesda. Please include this letter in the AB 786 hearing record.

<u>Closure is Premature</u>. This letter is to oppose AB 786, the permanent closure of Westbard Avenue at River Road, as premature. A decision on AB 786 should not be made until traffic studies have:

1)Evaluated the effectiveness of the realigned Westbard Avenue in diverting traffic from the Springfield neighborhood. This evaluation should be conducted following the completion of the Westbard Avenue realignment and the completion and stabilization (attainment of long-term occupancy levels, often defined as occupancy at 12 months post-completion) of all phases of Westbard Square in order to account for the establishment of new traffic patterns.

2)Evaluated the probable impact of the permanent closure of Westbard Avenue at River Road on adjacent streets and on the Springfield neighborhood generally. Again, such studies should await the establishment of new traffic patterns following the completion of the Westbard Avenue realignment and the completion and stabilization of all phases of construction at Westbard Square, including the new Giant, additional retail/office space, the assisted living facility, apartments and townhomes.

<u>Springfield Neighborhood Traffic Problems</u>. A key reason to oppose the closure of Westbard Avenue at River Road at this time is the fact that recent detours have caused substantial and continuing traffic problems in the Springfield neighborhood. In light of these problems, careful study is needed before closing another through street. Recent problems include the following:

- •The closing of Westbard Avenue initially diverted over 5,000 vehicles per day, including heavy trucks, to Ridgefield Road, a situation alleviated only by making Ridgefield Road temporarily one way.
- •The changes in traffic patterns due to the Westbard Avenue closure have imposed an unacceptable cut-through traffic burden on Ogden Road, a small street with limited capacity. Recent review indicates that over 80% of the Ogden Road cut-through traffic has been speeding, presenting a safety hazard.
- •The Westbard Avenue closure has shifted additional traffic to Cromwell Drive. This situation is potentially hazardous because Wood Acres Elementary School is located there.

Assess Impact of New Westbard Square Development. A second reason to defer a decision to permanently close the 5500 block of Westbard Avenue is the need to accurately assess the impact of added density at Westbard Square on traffic patterns. The new Westbard Square development, scheduled for completion in 2026, will include the newly expanded Giant store, additional retail/office space, an assisted living center with 90 parking spaces and, most significantly, 300+ apartments and townhomes on the Westbard Square site and on what has been lower Ridgefield Road at River Road. This new construction will significantly increase traffic volume in the area of the realigned Westbard Avenue, and could adversely affect traffic conditions on surrounding neighborhood streets.

The impact of closing Westbard Avenue at River Road should be evaluated in the context of this new residential density. A real-time post-completion evaluation is preferable to a forward-looking study because of the uncertainty surrounding the performance of the realigned Westbard Avenue in diverting traffic from the Springfield neighborhood. The study should await the attainment of stabilized occupancy levels (that is, long-term post-completion occupancy) at Westbard Square, traditionally defined in the real estate industry as 12 months following the completion of construction.

<u>Lack of Neighborhood Representation</u>. A final reason to defer consideration of the closure of the 5500 block of Ridgefield Road is the lack of broad neighborhood representation in drafting and submitting the current petition.

The petition to permanently close Westbard Avenue at River Road was submitted by a group representing only the 24 or so homes on the 5500 block of Westbard Avenue. The Springfield Civic Association, which represents the approximately 650 homes in the Springfield neighborhood — including the 5500 block of Westbard Avenue — was not informed of the road closure petition and was not consulted in its drafting. The Springfield Civic Association and the residents of Springfield should be given an opportunity to express their views on AB 786 before this consequential decision is made.

Thank you for your attention to this letter. Again, I oppose AB 786 as premature. Additional traffic studies should be conducted after completion and stabilization of Westbard Square to assess new traffic patterns and the adequacy of the realigned roadway in diverting traffic from the Springfield neighborhood. These studies are needed to evaluate whether AB 786 would adversely affect the Springfield neighborhood. In addition, the views of the Springfield Civic Association and the residents of the broader Springfield community should be fully considered.
