


Cervical Cancer Awareness Month

January is Cervical Cancer Awareness Month. Montgomery County continues to lead the state with lowest incidence (at all stages) and mortality rates of cervical cancer. However, disparities persist among those affected. Notably, Hispanic residents experience the highest incidence rates.


Cervical cancer is one of the most preventable cancers as a result of the Human Papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine and cervical cancer screening (1). Prevention and early detection are key. The American Cancer Society Guidelines for Cervical Cancer Screening recommends that women and other individuals with a cervix at average risk should start screening at age 25 and continue until at least age 65 (2). The HPV vaccine can prevent over 90% of cancers caused by HPV (1). The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends routine HPV vaccination for all adolescents starting between age 9 and 12 years (3).

Montgomery County offers safety net programs for those who are seeking cervical cancer screening and HPV vaccines:

- **Cervical Cancer Screening:** Montgomery Cares is a safety net medical program that provides basic medical services. Some of the Montgomery Cares participating clinics offer cervical screenings. - **HPV Vaccines:** HPV vaccines are available to children who are uninsured or have Medicaid at Montgomery County Department of Health and Human Services Health Centers through the Vaccines for Children Program. Those with private insurance should talk with their PCP about how to obtain it.

National Blood Donor Month

Every 2 seconds someone in the U.S. needs blood and or platelets (4). Since 1969, January has been designated as National Blood Donor month to honor the voluntary blood donors and encourage more people to give blood. By donating blood, you can save more than one life. The American Red Cross is partnering with the NFL during National Blood Donor Month to address blood shortage. All who come to give blood or platelets January 1 to 25, 2026 will automatically be entered for a chance to win a



Respiratory Virus

Montgomery County health officials are advising communities and healthcare facilities that the Maryland Department of Health (MDH) has issued a statewide recommendation to wear masks in all patient facing health care settings. This recommendation comes as the statewide respiratory virus-associated hospitalization rate has exceeded the threshold of 10 hospitalizations per 100,000 residents. Vaccinations remain the best way to reduce severe illness, hospitalizations, and strain on the health care system.

- Annual **flu** vaccination is recommended for everyone ages 6 months and older, with high-dose options for adults 65 and older and a nasal spray option for many children and adults.
- **RSV** protection is also available, including vaccines for older adults and pregnant individuals to protect newborns, as well as antibody protection for high-risk infants during RSV season.

- The updated **COVID-19** vaccine is designed to protect against currently circulating strains and is recommended for older adults, people with underlying health conditions, pregnant individuals, and many children, and remains widely available and covered by insurance in Maryland.
- **Access:** Documentation is not required to prove immunocompromised status. Vaccinators are explicitly instructed not to deny vaccination due to a lack of medical records or paperwork.

Vaccination remains the most effective way to protect yourself, your family, and the community during this respiratory virus surge.
