The Commission also aims to encourage and facilitate initiatives that seek to understand this legacy and build bridges of reconciliation.

What does reconciliation mean to YOU? What do you envision reconciliation can and should look like in Montgomery County with the right attention, intention and effort? (i.e., through policy, education, the arts, memorial markers, etc.)
