#### **DIRECTOR'S REPORT:**

- Personnel: Update on new hires, transfers, separations from County services.
- Construction/Renovation Updates:
  - O Damascus Library Design Development submission was made on March 11 and is under review.
  - General Charles E. McGee Library Need one more signature on the program of requirements (PRO) to be complete.
  - o Noves Library for Young Children Attic area has been cleaned.

- Clarksburg Library The Program of Requirements, which was revised to reflect the new site selected, was sent for signatures in March. A public meeting was held at Rocky Hill Middle School on March 21. Request for Task Order Proposal was released to G+P on April 30. The County completed acquiring the property at 23200 Stringtown Rd., which, together with the property at 23311 Frederick Rd., will be used for the library and future affordable housing development.
  - Exploring placing holds lockers at an interim site in Clarksburg.
- Next library to start renovations will be in accordance with the FY25-30 CIP Library Refurbishment approved by the Office of Management and Budget.
- Freedom to Read Act Sponsored by Sen. Nancy King and Del. Dana Jones of Anne Arundel County; signed into law by Governor Moore in mid-April.
- The 2024 <u>Summer Reading Challenge</u> will begin on Friday, June 14, with a theme of *Adventure Starts Here*. The slogan represents exploring and getting to know your community. There will be six indoor-outdoor kick-off events to celebrate the start of the Summer Reading Challenge:
