Royce Hanson Ribbon Cutting

We officially celebrated the ribbon cutting at Royce Hanson Regional Park on November 1—and it's already a popular destination! Our team built 5 miles of trails, created a 50-acre meadow, conducted archaeological reviews, and confirmed exciting wildlife sightings like a bobcat. The park honors Dr. Royce Hanson, former chair of the Montgomery County Planning Board and a lifelong advocate for environmental stewardship and smart growth—a vision that continues to inspire us.

Eye Spy Train

The Halloween Eye Spy Trains event wrapped up at Cabin John and Wheaton Regional Parks after running on weekends throughout October. The themes were Día de los Trenes at Cabin John Train and Trainsylvania at Wheaton Train. Wheaton welcomed nearly 10,000 attendees, while Cabin John had over 6,000.

Birdability Week: October 20 to October 29

Montgomery Parks celebrated Birdability Week (Oct. 20–27), promoting accessible and inclusive birding through programs at all four Nature Centers, led by Ashlyn Thompson and a committee of Park Naturalists and local birding groups. Highlights included Beginning Birding for Every Body! at Brookside, Bird Nerd Night at Locust Grove, and an Early Morning Pontoon Cruise at Black Hill, with exhibitors such as Nature Forward, DC Bird Alliance, Montgomery Bird Club, Feminist Bird Club, and Readability. Activities featured hands-on sessions like Flat Birds, helping participants practice using field guides and binoculars with paper birds that don't fly away.

Acoustics and Ales Witch Paddle

We hosted the final Acoustics and Ales of the season at Black Hill Regional Park on Saturday, October 25. This one-of-a-kind event featured Black Hill Discovery's Witchy Paddle as part of the program. Nearly 100 paddlers took to Little Seneca Lake in their best witchy attire for the costumed paddle. Afterward, guests enjoyed local beer and mead, food trucks, a campfire with s'mores, and live bluegrass music from Sweet Yonder. The combined event drew an estimated 850 attendees. Special thanks to the Northern Region and PACP for supporting and promoting the event, and to Park Police for keeping everyone safe on the lake and on shore.

Park Facelift at Takoma Urban Park

Thanks to an FY26 operating budget request, Montgomery Parks now has dedicated funding for the new Park Facelift Program, starting with Takoma Urban Park. Phase I, completed Oct. 17, included pressure washing playground equipment, walls, and walkways; replacing benches, picnic tables, wood borders, and fencing; removing a kiosk and trash can; and adding an equipment pad and fresh wood fiber. Phase II will focus on the upper park area with tree pruning, stump removal, sidewalk repairs, pressure washing, bench and table replacements, and paint touch-ups.

Urban Wood Sale - Save the Date - November 15

The popular Urban Wood Sale returns to Green Farm on November 15! As part of the Green Waste Recycling Program, logs from hazard trees are milled into usable wood products for park projects, producing about 60,000 board feet annually for lumber, truck boards, stakes, benches, planters, and specialty items. What we don't use, we sell—air-dried, planed pine, poplar, oak, beech, and more—with proceeds reinvested into the program.

NPDES Permit

Earlier this month, we submitted our Annual Progress Report to MDE detailing how we keep stormwater pollution-free under the NPDES program, a federal Clean Water Act initiative regulating water pollution. Montgomery Parks is regulated through an MS4 permit requiring treatment of 20% of untreated impervious surfaces by 2025—and we exceeded the goal by 5.39 acres! Out of 413 acres of impervious surface, 332.43 were untreated, meaning we needed 66.5 acres treated; we achieved over 71.9 acres. The permit also mandates public education, pollution prevention, and construction oversight.
